Dr. H. L. McCarthy To Address Jewish Women On Social Security

The discussion on "Social Security and Its Relation to Minorities in the Post-War World," commenced in October will be continued in November, announces the steering committee of the study group for the North Shore Jewish Women's organizations. The interest manifested at the initial meeting was so pronounced that Dr. H. L. McCarthy who presented the topic was prompted to proffer his services for the next meeting. From a further explanation of the complexities of the present law he will move to a consideration of proposed amendments looking toward broadening the base of those entitled to benefits; augmenting the size of said benefits; and extending benefits to other social fields. To members who wish to pursue the subject still more extensively Dr. McCarthy will distribute a bibliography of collateral reading such as is used by his students at the University of Chicago. His nine years' experience as regional director of the Social Security board gives him the privilege of speaking with authority.

To the women of the community a rare opportunity is offered to obtain an understanding of one of the nation's most vital social measures now before Congress. An enlightened citizenry appraising its representatives of its thoughts on proposed legislation and current laws tends to develop more constructive action. The meeting is set for Tuesday, Nov. 6, at 1:30 sharp, at the Temple in Glencoe. Attendance is not confined to members of the study group. Everyone is urged to attend. There is no admission charge.
