Coast Guard Shortens Boot Training for Best Qualified Recruits

Coast guard boot training has been cut from 12 to eight weeks for recruits who qualify to attend specialist schools at the end of their basic course, according to an announcement today from the Chicago recruiting office, 610 S. Canal St., Formerly boot training lasted 12 weeks.

A week's leave will be given at the end of boot training, both to men going out on general duty and to those continuing their preparation in radio, electricity and aviation schools, according to Lt. D. E. Rowand, recruiting officer in Chicago.

Two-year enlistments in the regular coast guard are now open to men 17 through 25 who pass physical and mental qualifying tests.
