War Veterans Organize To Boost GOP Aspirants

A new Lake county political group, including only veterans of A Scientist Makes a World Wars I and II has been formed, according to Glenn Kapschull of Deerfield, its publicity chairman, for the sole purpose of backing the Republican party.
