**Dictionaries**  
 Besides the well-known English dictionaries such as Webster's and Funk & Wagnall's, one can find Latin, Greek, Italian, French, Spanish, German, Russian, Swedish, Finnish, and Hebrew dictionaries.

**Encyclopedias**  
 General—Encyclopedia Britannica—written from a British point of view. Especially good in fields of history, art and literature.  
 Americana—Better for science and technology.  
 Lincoln Library of Essential Information—handy 1-volume encyclopedia designed for self instruction.  
 World Book Encyclopedia and Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia—for younger readers.  
 Special—Encyclopedia of the Social Sciences—especially useful for information on law, psychology, anthropology, labor and economics. Gives a great deal of biological information on persons prominent in the field of social science.  
 Encyclopedia of Religion and Ethics—good for comparative accounts of primitive religions and movements. Treats of ethics as well as religions.  
 Catholic Encyclopedia—standard work in English on all Catholic subjects.  
 Jewish Encyclopedia—records history, religion, literature and customs of Jewish people.
