When the Marine corporal who was forced to lower the stars and stripes over Pieping, China, December 8, 1941, had completed that humiliating task, he remarked to Richard P. Butrick, U. S. Embassy Counsellor, who had received the order from the Japs: "I hope I did it well, sir. You see, it's the first time I ever had to lower the Stars and Stripes."

Recently an impressive ceremony took place on the same spot. The same flag which had been lowered was again raised in the presence of Marines, in battle green, standing at attention, and a crowd of American, Chinese and other dignitaries. The banner was raised as the band played "To The Colors!" followed by the "Marines' Hymn."

"I only regret," said Butrick, present at the time, and who had preserved the lowered flag, brought it to the States when he was repatriated in June, 1942, and taken it back to China with him for this special purpose, "that the same corporal (unknown) who lowered it is not here to raise it again." Another Marine corporal stood proxy for him.

The flag is to be replaced and returned to the States to be displayed at some future time.
