Local Infant Welfare Members Attend Annual Meeting in Chicago

New enthusiasm for the work of the Infant Welfare society was gained by 35 members of the Highland Park center as they joined with other Infant Welfare members in the society's 35th annual meeting last week in Chicago.

With 4,776 infants cared for in 1945, only 13 deaths occurred, according to Dr. Heyworth N. Sanford, medical director of the Infant Welfare society, who spoke at the luncheon. The total number of individuals cared for in 1945 (including infants, children up to six years, and pre-natal cases) was given as 10,207, as compared with 2,129 in 1911, when the society was founded.

The society serves children in the poorest areas of Chicago by providing medical supervision in 21 stations and health education in the homes by nurses and nutritionists.

The auxiliary, comprised of 34 centers of which the Highland Park group is one, raised 60 per cent of the funds contributed to the society last year.

Mrs. Robert Bussard, vice-president of the Highland Park junior group, gave the local annual report at the business session preceding the luncheon.
