**World Friendship**

All Scouts of the North Shore area council are working earnestly and quietly in the Worldwide movement program known as "World Friendship." Each scout is making some contribution to the World Friendship fund.

Mr. Clifton G. Speer, scout executive of the North Shore area for the past fourteen years, has this to say about the World Friendship fund: "A good many of us like the feeling of knowing what our money will buy when we give to a cause. We have figured roughly that \$25.00 contributed by a pack or troop might buy the following: A pair of Morse signal flags, semaphore signal flags, semaphore signal flag sticks, axe, sheath-knife, flashlight, signal chart, compass, firemaking set, first aid troop pouch, small wall tent, cook-kit, canteen, and a copy of each of the various handbooks and manuals for cub scouts, boy scouts and senior scouts and for their leaders.

"With some such equipment a troop of foreign boys who had literally nothing would suddenly, because of the generosity of American scouts, have enough to go on a camping trip. One cook-kit might have to do for everybody and the tent would overflow, but what of it? A group of American boys like themselves had cared enough to give them a start. That is all they ask of us."

**Troop Ratings**

Troop 30 of Highland Park received 1161 points to lead all troops in the "50 or more registered Scouts" area. This rating usually based on advancement, recruiting, camping and tenure.

In district rating on the same basis, Highland Park was second only to Kenilworth, with 752 points.

In increase of membership, Highland Park was 4th in both 1944 and 1945.
