John R. Bills Is Candidate for Office Of Lake County Judge

John R. Bills, whose ad appears in another column of this newspaper, was among the first to offer himself as a candidate for the office of County Judge of Lake county. Mr. Bills, who is a lifelong resident of Lake county, and his family before him, have been members of the Republican party during that time. His friends claim that he is eminently qualified for this important position, having had active experience as a sitting judge in the following courts: Zion City Court, County Court of Lake county, Probate Court of Lake county, and Circuit Court of Lake county. Further he has been honored by being called to sit in the Municipal Court of Evanston as well as Superior Court of Cook county. He had had many glowing praises from the members of the bar of Cook county for his work in Superior Court in Cook county where he sat from time to time as a trial judge.

He, his family, relatives and associates have never been known to engage in bi-partisan political entangling alliances.

His friends claim that he has earned his right to ask the Republican party for recognition. He is married and is the father of two children of school age. He has been active in political circles throughout the county. He is active in religious and fraternal circles and he has been for some time chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Memorial church in Zion. He is a member of the American Legion and at the present time Judge Advocate of his post and has been Judge Advocate of the 10th District Organization, and of the 40 & 8 Voiture No. 604. He is also active in the Boy Scouts of America. Mr. Bills states in keeping with his professional judicial ethics that in the event he is elected County Judge he will devote his entire time to the court and will not in any manner practice law nor will he have connection with any law firm either directly or indirectly. Mr. Bills served Lake county from 1932-40 as a full time assistant state's at-

torney, being assigned to the County Court where he became thoroughly familiar with the working of that court, particularly involving dependent and neglected children. He is a graduate of Northwestern university. He has practiced law in Waukegan for almost a quarter of a century. He has also been Corporation Counsel of the City of Zion. He organized the first fire protection district in Antioch and later he organized the Bonnie Brook fire protection district and now represents the district.

LAY HEALTH CLINIC

(Continued from page 1) has no official maternal welfare clinic at the present time.

The public health program of the Cook county department of health was studied as an example of public health service which could be rendered in this community. The standards which an ideal public health program should meet were outlined as follows:

1. It should completely cover all situations that affect public health.

2. It should be adequately staffed by qualified personnel.

3. Necessary laws and ordinances should be in effect. (For instance, food handlers in Highland Park do not have to meet any health standards.)

4. It should have the money needed. (About \$57,000 is spent in Lake county for all health services. According to a government survey an adequate program should cost about \$120,000.)

5. It should have good administration.

6. It should have public concern.

Miss Lulu Lasswell, public health nurse at the Highland Park high school, explained the way communicable diseases are con-

trolled in the schools with special reference to the current scarlet fever epidemic.

The next meeting will be held Tuesday, March 5, at the home of Mrs. Louis P. Haller, 290 Marshall, at 1:15 p.m. Miss Elizabeth Hittle of the State Department of Public Health will define the meaning of public health doctor, nurse, nutritionist and engineer. She will also review the various units of the government in the county and their responsibilities as related to public health. All those interested are welcome.
