Seed Planting Practices

The highest quality seed will not show a profitable growth unless it has been properly planted. Or in reverse, the best planting methods will not show good returns from inferior seeds.

If old seed is to be utilized, germination tests should be made early. When a high percentage of germination results the seeds may be used, otherwise immediate plans should be made to secure suitable stock.

Planting methods vary with the locality and the type of soil. It may be advisable to plant in beds or ridges in order to obtain good drainage in some gardens. Level planting is recommended on the lighter sandy soils and on the majority of the sandy loam and clay loam soils. In irrigation sections the seeds are usually planted on the side of the furrows a little above the irrigation water level.

Seeds and labor may be saved by proper sowing. In many soils it will pay to mix a small quantity of fine soil to cover the seeds.

In actual sowing, take the seeds in the fingers and drop them evenly. See that the seeds are spaced evenly and thinly, even though it

means that each seed be handled individually. The experienced gardener, who has a steady hand may find it advisable to sow directly from an envelope or seed package as shown in illustration.

When planting large seeds they may be sowed in pairs to insure an even stand. If both seeds grow, one plant of each pair may be pulled up to prevent crowding. On the average, with fresh seeds of standard germination, it should be sufficient to sow 50 per cent more seeds than you expect to mature plants.

Check These Hazards

Are electrical fixtures and appliances located and used beyond arm's length of the sink, stove, tub, shower or other grounded metal objects?

Do you avoid touching electrical fixtures or appli fixtures or appliances when hands are wet, or when standing on a wet floor?

Are all electrical devices disconnected when not in use?

Are porcelain electric fixtures in basement, bathroom, and kitchen.

Is there an insulating link in the chain on all pull type sockets?

Are rubber covered extension cords used in bathroom and basement?

Do you disconnect any household appliances before attempting to make repairs or adjustments?

Are all unused, open, screw-type sockets plugged permanently?

Do you repair frayed and worn electric cords, or discard them if repairs cannot be made?

Are lamps placed so that long extension cords are unnecessary? Do you keep cords out from under rugs, doors, and movable furniture?

Are children taught never to touch electric sockets or fixtures?

PUBLIC LIBRARY

At random among some of the new books in the Highland Park public library will be found:

For those who find fascination in the study of Oriental rugs the new revised edition of "The Practical Book of Oriental Rugs" by G. Griffen Lewis will be of interest. The book not only gives excellent information, but is beautifully illustrated, containing 32 color plates, 80 half-tones, and many line designs.

"Fashion Is Our Business" by Beryl Williams, is for those who are interested in clothes. Included in this book is the fashion philosophy of such outstanding American designers as Clare Potter, Hattie Carnegie, Claire McCardell, Philip Mangone, Edith Head and others prominent in their respective fields. There are excellent photographic studies of each of the designers and an example of a characteristic design.

"Golf After Forty" by H. A. Hattstrom is a common sense approach of the game. The language is direct and the book is well-illustrated.

Two new books in the field of medicine have been added to the collection. "Mind, Medicine, and Man," by Gregory Zilboorg, is a book of psychiatry written for the layman. It is in part a history of this new field in medicine, but it also approaches the subject in such a way that the reader can distinguish between fads and fundamentals. The author graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia university in 1926, was Noguchi lecturer on the history of medicine in Johns Hopkins university in 1935, has been on the staff of the Psychoanalytic Institute of Berlin and of the Bloomingdale hospital in New York. Since 1931 he has been in private practice in psychiatry and psychoanalysis in New York City.

"Man Against Pain," by Howard R. Raper is the story of anesthesia. The book is divided into four parts. Part 1, Background—is the time of failure and superstition; Part 2, Discovery—is the story of the early successes of anesthesia. Part 3, Controversy—is the record of conflict. This part discusses the work of the men who have been variously credited with the discovery of anesthesia. Part 4, A Story of Progress—deals with modern anesthesia and includes a chapter on anesthetics in World War II. Dr. Raper has spent twenty years of research in the history of anesthesia.
