AN EDITORIAL

Congressman Ralph Church of Evanston will be re-nominated as the Republican candidate for Congress at the Primaries next Tuesday, April 9th, by a plurality worthily expressive both of his achievements in Congress and the merited appreciation of this District. He has served fearlessly, ably and successfully.

Congressman Church has proved himself admirably qualified to represent this district. His record of constructive public service-16 years in the Illinois Legislative and five terms in the Congress-has never been challenged. This District is proud to have a man of his calibre in Washington.

Congressman Church's attention to the interests of the Tenth District is well known. He re-opened Great Lakes Naval Training Station in 1935. He had the Navy acquire Glenview Air Field. He sponsored improvements at Fort Sheridan. He is at present urging a second Annapolis to be established at Great Lakes. In short, throughout his entire service in Congress, he has diligently and successfully looked after the interests of his District and the personal problems of his constituents.

Church has proved to be not only a sound thinker but also a fearless leader in expressing his views. It will be recalled that even in the days when radical New Deal experiments were extremely popular, Mr. Church was outspoken in opposition to "blank check" expenditures and "abdication of Congress in delegating broad powers to the executive." As a member of the Committee on Expenditures in the Executive Departments, Congressman Church has been leading the fight for re-organization of the Government, for the elimination of duplications, red-tape and waste, and for reducing Federal Expenditures. He is rendering invaluable service in securing practical solutions to the problems of reconversion from a war-

time to a peace-time economy.

Mr. Church's opponent must be finding himself in a ridiculous position. He claims some Republican commitments—but it now appears that after he obtained some commitments or endorsements from some Republicans, it has been discovered that he is in reality a New Dealer. He was employed from October 4, 1941, to April 25, 1942, on the Democratic payroll of OEM and thereafter on another New Deal payroll, NHA, where he remained until August 17, 1942. The records of this latter New deal organization show him listed as being on military furlough, which indicates his plan to return to the Democratic Federal payroll. Certainly such New Deal positions on agencies noted for Federal bureaucratic incompetence are sorry qualifications for seeking nomination, especially in a Republican Primary!

The intelligent voters of the Touth District will go to the polls next Tuesday and overwhelmingly return Ralph Church to Congress, where his knowledge, experience and ability will prove invaluable in solving our national and international postwar problems.
