**7-Point Clean-up Program Issued By Fire Chief**

In cooperation with the National Fire Protection association, sponsors of the Spring Clean-Up campaign, Fire Chief Hennig today issued a 7-point list of things to do while spring cleaning:

1. Check from cellar to attic, inside and outside the house, and remove all rubbish, old magazines, newspapers and other useless household accumulations. Waste paper and rags are still needed for salvage. Rubbish is a double fire hazard. It may ignite spontaneously or it may serve as quick fuel for a stray spark.
2. Keep oily rags in metal containers, or burn them if practical.
3. Examine heating system for cracks or other defects; clean soot from chimney and flues. Repair defects promptly.
4. Keep ashes in covered metal containers; shield fireplace with screens.
5. Examine roof for leaks and breaks. Recover weather-worn roofs with a fire-resistant material such as asphalt shingles.
6. Check electric wiring and replace worn and frayed cords on appliances. Clean dust and dirt from fuse boxes.
7. Do not use flammable cleaning fluids.

In a timely warning to returned Highland Park veterans and other prospective home owners, Fire Chief Hennig urged all local residents to beware of the post war "jerry-built" house.

Chief Hennig commented, "and neglecting one of the most important considerations of all fire safety. Make fire safety the cornerstone of your new home and choose common sense fire safety as well as liveability when planning the new home."

The chief called upon all Highland Park residents planning new or renovated homes to provide for ample space requirements for safe installation of heating appliances and fuel storage which he said are as essential as adequate space for family comfort.

"Closest space and storage room should be large enough to reduce congestion and to promote good housekeeping, and second floors should be equipped with some means of exit, such as a garage or porch room, in case of fire emergency."

Chief Hennig recommends careful inspection during the construction period to prevent poor workmanship or possible substitution of inferior materials and equipment. "It is particularly important that chimneys, heating ducts and electrical wiring, which will be concealed in walls, partitions and ceilings, are inspected for compliance with plans and specifications before they are closed in, the chief emphasized.

One of the most essential fire safety measures, according to the chief, is design and installation of an adequate, safe electrical wiring system in accordance with the provisions of the National Fire Protection association's national electrical code.
