Swanson Is Re-elected To District 107 School Board

Emmett Moroney Promises Speedy Action by Lake Co. Housing Authority

The Lake County Housing Authority commissioners, who were approved April 10 by the Illinois State Housing board, were promised a full work schedule by Temple McFayden, chairman of the State Housing board, when he informed the new commissioners that all the barracks at Camp Dahlgren at Great Lakes Naval Training station will be available for reconversion into veteran apartments by May 1.

McFayden also announced, from notice received from the Navy, that 42 buildings in the adjoining Camps Maury and Mahan were being released to Federal Housing Authority by the Navy in the very near future. These Navy buildings will in turn be released to the newly organized, Lake County Housing Authority as soon as sufficient funds are allocated and reconversion is completed to prepare for veteran occupancy.

Plans to convert the empty Navy quarters were initiated by Gov. Dwight H. Green and McFayden three months ago. The Navy has cooperated to its fullest extent by drawing up plans to convert each of these large, modern barracks into 16 two-room and 8 three-room apartments.

All necessary utilities of light, water and sewage are already in. Once the entire Green Bay area, which lies west of Green Bay road is released, the sector will be a little city of its own, containing approximately 3,000 veteran families, community stores, laundries, and 3 recreational areas containing a shore swimming pool in the area.

The Ninth Naval district believes because of the Navy's accelerated discharge program, the entire Green Bay area will be available for veteran housing by September 1 of this year.

When notified of the availability of the Naval quarters, Chairman Emmett Moroney of the Lake County Housing Authority, stated that the newly organized authority will act quickly and abreast of the housing crisis.

The five men approved by the State Housing board on the Lake County Housing Authority membership are: Chairman Emmett Moroney, Highland Park; D. A. Hentges, Lake Forest; B. F. Stein, Lake County; F. B. Gilmer, Libertyville; and Oscar Soderquist, Waukegan.

In addition, the Naval department has released 4 barracks of the Naval Air station at Glenview to be used for veteran housing. These quarters will be turned over to the newly approved Cook County Housing authority under the same procedure as Naval quarters are to be turned over to Lake County authority just as soon as President Clayton Smith of the Cook county board appoints five members to the Authority's membership.

Under procedure of the Federal government, the Great Lakes and Glenview facilities which are released by the Navy for veteran housing, will be transferred first to the National Housing administration and in turn to the local housing authorities. Under the Mead Bill, enacted by Congress, federal funds are made available for the conversion of such federal properties for housing use. As the cost of such conversion would be relatively low, much smaller than the cost of installing separate, demountable units, it is believed the project would be entirely self-liquidating even though rents would be moderate.

School District 107 polled the largest vote in many years in one of only two contested board elections in the Highland Park-Highwood-Deerfield area.

Of the 802 votes cast Arthur H. Swanson received 686 in his re-election for a one-year term as president. Swanson has held the post for 14 years.

Robert J. Koretz won 643 votes and Franklin Lunding 476 to defeat Lester Britton with 377 votes for offices as board members. Koretz will serve three years while Lunding will fill the unexpired 3-year term of O. W. Frost.

Voters approved a \$100,000 bond issue for physical improvements in the school system by 607-94. They also voted for a possible increase to \$1.125 in the tax rate for educational fund purposes.

V. William Bridle of Highwood was defeated in the race for three year term as member of the combined board of Highland Park and Lake Forest high school. Harold Norman of Deerfield got 1,068 votes and Jess Halsted of Highland Park polled 948 to Bridle's 247. A total of 1,295 ballots was cast in the five precincts.

The board elects its own president. Holdover members included George Rogers of Lake Forest; Howard Wood of Lake Bluff and Mrs. Mason Smith of Highland Park.

Unopposed slates included:

Vernon Giss of Deerfield, was elected president of the Deerfield Grammar school board for a one-year term. He polled 52 of the 62 votes cast. Board members will include Thomas Wiley of Highland Park, 55 votes, Burton McRoy of Deerfield, 40 votes, and Mrs. Robert Huepel of Deerfield, 35 votes. Mrs. Huepel will fill the unexpired two-year term of Walter Eige. McRoy has been president of the board since it became a seven-member organization seven years ago.

The Bannockburn and the Wilmet school districts held caucuses immediately before their elections. Bannockburn school directors will be Forrest Laidley, George Stanwood and Mrs. J. B. Cleaver. Laidley is now filling the unexpired term of Harold Norman.

Elected as directors at Wilmet school were Warren Darling, Mrs. Fred Marx and L. J. Hurlbert. Raymond Wible was chosen as board president in Highland Park District 108, polling 134 of the 135 votes cast. Mrs. Hazel Cederberg and Hamilton Winton won board posts.
