## Mrs. Anderson Elected National President Of Y. W. C. A.

On May 1, Mrs. Arthur Forrest Anderson of New York and Connecticut was elected to succeed Mrs. Henry A. Ingraham as president of the National Board of the Young Women's Christian association of the United States. Mrs. Anderson has been a member of one Board since 1936 and has also served as chairman of the Finance Committee. A graduate of Vassar, she was first associated with the YWCA in New York, of which she was president.

In accepting this office, Mrs. Anderson undertakes a heavy responsibility, as the National Board acts as a clearing house and point of contact for all YWCA activities in the country, and represents the American Association in the World's Council of YWCAs. There are now in this country 434 urban groups, 373 village and rural clubs, 559 college campus groups and 77 negro community YWCAs, all affiliated with the National Board in New York City.

## Girl Scouts-Brownies Present Folk Program

Five hundred Highland Park Girl Scouts and Brownies, in costumes of many nations, will present a program of folk dances and tableaux as a part of their spring festival, Sunday afternoon, May 19, in Sunset park.

A loud speaker system will carry the event, commencing at 2:30, to an audience of parents and friends expected to number more than a thousand. Later in the day the girls will engage in a series of races and games, followed by a picnic supper, provided by parents.

In making public its schedule of events the local Girl Scout office has announced the launching this week of a campaign among Girl Scout parents to raise \$15,000 for the purchase of some ten acres of land on the Des Plaines river, six and one-half miles west of Highland Park, and the building of an overnight troop cabin, long a vital need. The drive, conducted with the permission of the Community Chest and the approval of Mayor Joseph B. Garnett, will be spearheaded by a group of interested fathers who have already held several meetings to plan the project.

Sunday's festival is in charge of Co-chairmen Mrs. Hamilton R. Winton and Mrs. Wyatt Jacobs, assisted by troop leaders, by Scout Director Mrs. Edward Alt, and by Scout Commissioner Mrs. Jesse M. Watkins Jr. Mrs. Leonard Davidson will act as commentator, introducing the various events.

Opened by a bugle call sounded by Scout Bugler Judith MacCordquodale, the program will feature the presentation of American flags to the fifth grade troops of Ravinia, Braeside and Lincoln schools, and the seventh grade troop of Ravinia by Mrs. Erastus R. Phelps, past regent of the local chapter of D.A.R. Presentation of flags to local Girl Scout troops is made regularly by the Highland Park D.A.R.

Children from seven schools will participate in the dances and tableaux, which are built around the theme of world friendship developed by Juliette Low, founder of Girl Scouting, and carried forward since her death by Girl Scout organizations the world over. Many of the older girls taking part have been corresponding, as a means of getting acquainted, with Girl Scouts in Europe, Latin America and the Far East.

Folk dancing will be to the music of Louis Garino, accordionist.

In the event of inclement weather, the festival will be postponed until Sunday, May 26.
