## Lytton, Famous Chicago Merchant, Now A Centenarian

Henry C. Lytton, founder and president of the Chicago store which bears his name, and sole survivor of the fourteen State Street pioneers who built the world's most famous shopping thoroughfare, was one hundred years old July 13. He spent the day in St. Joseph, Michigan, where he is staying for the summer.

Many Highland Parkers remember when his son, George, now deceased, married the former Marion Schwarz, a Highland Park girl, who spent her girlhood and was married at her home on 380 Vine, now torn down. Later the George Lyttons made their home, for about five years, at a house purchased from Charles Yoe, at the corner of Lake and Hazel. His two daughters attended school here.

Born in New York City, Henry Lytton began his business career at 19 as office boy for an attorney. His entry into his chosen field came a year later, and led him to St. Louis, then to Ionia, Mich., where, with an elder brother, he opened a clothing store, catering to lumbermen and farmers. Before his 21st birthday, another store was opened in Grand Rapids, Mich.

Caught with an overloaded inventory by the panic of 1873, Mr. Lytton refused to accept bankruptcy as a solution to his difficulties, but made what payment he could to each creditor, eventually paying every debt in full, although it took him 20 years to do so.

A few years as a traveling salesman were followed by the taking over of a debt-ridden store in Indianapolis. In four years the business was \$350,000 in the clear.

In 1887, when Chicago was still shuddering at the memory of the great fire, and boasted a population of 70,000, Mr. Lytton opened The Hub, a store at Jackson and State. Its growth resulted in the purchase, in 1912, of the present property across the street, now bearing the name of "Lytton's."

Although a centenarian, Mr. Lytton is partially active in the management of his business, and almost daily visits his office to check on sales figures, advertising, and other phases of operation.

## Plans To Launch Safe Driving Campaign

Highland Park resident Norman W. LeVally of 357 Hazel avenue, with his company, Shaw-LeVally, Inc., advertising agency, of 228 N. LaSalle St., Chicago, will conduct the first post-war safe driving campaign through advertising for the firm's client, Lumbermens Mutual Casualty Co. James S. Kemper, ex-head of the United States Chamber of Commerce, is president of Lumbermens.

The campaign starts off with a series of one- and two-page ads in the Saturday Evening Post and will utilize national advertising media.

With an estimated 38,000 persons to be killed along our streets and highways in 1946 by auto accidents, Shew-LeVally is putting Lumbermens first into the field of national advertisers to do something about the nation's appalling traffic toll with the backing of a large portion of an advertising budget.

Calling the auto in careless hands an "atom bomb on wheels" and "kamikaze-American style," the first ads point out some very salient facts about road accidents. Since V-J day, 30,290 have been killed in automobile accidents — an average of 95 men, women and children every 24 hours.

28,500 people were killed in 1945.  
16,000 died during the first six months of this year — a 43% increase over 1945.

## Ora Dale Puckett Returns From European Trip With USO Show

Last Monday morning Miss Ora Dale "O.D." Puckett arrived at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Puckett, 679 Pleasant Ct., after a 7-months tour through Europe with a USO show. The company presented the musical show "Good News" to American occupation troops.

Blond Miss Puckett, who is a slender 5 feet six, expresses herself as greatly thrilled at her experiences, and ready to go out again, wherever the USO decrees — possibly in a variety show to Japan. She returned on the "Charles A. Stafford," a hospital ship carrying about 600 bed patients and a few civilians.

Of the countries she saw — France, Germany, Bavaria, Austria and Bremerhaven, "O.D." considers Bavaria and southern France the most beautiful — as regards scenery. But the people "are beautiful," she declares, "are beautiful." While in Germany she met four Highland Parkers, Walter Hiller, Jack Kilian (stationed at Bremerhaven), Renny Lautmann and Fred Clavey.

Miss Puckett describes the women of France and Germany as poorly dressed. Shoes are from \$30 to \$40 a pair. Wistful children are constantly asking for candy. Where she saw few signs of starvation, the German women, especially, appeared quite buxom. The occupation troops get excellent food.

The company found their audiences appreciative. At one stand on the Swiss border they played to 16,000 men in the course of three shows. Often the men showed their gratitude with parties and gifts.

While in Bremerhaven Miss Puckett went aboard the Europa. All one day she attended the Nuremberg trial. She visited Hitler's Eagle's Nest several times, and had the use of the car of Emil Jannings, famous German actor.

But topping all her experiences, she admits, is the thrill of playing to 60,000 home-hungry American soldiers.

## Bill Chambers In All American Golf Tourney At Tam O'Shanter

Bill Chambers, Lake county golf champion of 1940 and 1942, will compete in the All-American golf tournament at Tam O'Shanter Country club, July 22-28.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Chambers, 220 McDaniels, and a veteran of World War II, Chambers served with the navy overseas for one year.

Leading the competition at present is Jimmy Johnson, sharp shooting golf pro of Glen Oaks Country club, Farmington, Mich., who out-paced a field of 76 pros from Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin in a recent 18-hole medal play qualifying round for the 1946 All-American golf tournaments at Tam O'Shanter Country club.

Shooting four birdies and one bogey, and missing eagle putts twice, Johnson went out in 35 and came home with 34 for a three-under-par 69.

Together with some pros from other states, the 40 who qualified will be tested for eligibility on July 24 for the All-American golf tournaments being held July 25 to 28 at Tam O'Shanter.
