It takes several years for the plant to mature to the blossombearing stage. Then a strong, thick flowered stalk is sent up, growing sometimes a foot in a single day, and often reaching a height of 12 feet,

Aside from its ornamental properties, the yucca was found by the Indians to be extremely useful. They used its roots for soap, the fibers of its leaves for weaving mats. The tender spring shoots were baked for food, and flour was made from the dried seeds. They used the blossom as a vegetable . . and, by the way, the succulent asparagus is a distant relative of the yucca.
