Irish To Observe Feast Day, Aug. 15 At Harms Park

With Bishop Bernard J. Sheil as honorary chairman, annual "Irish Day" will be observed Aug. 15 at Harms park, 4207 N. Western avenue. It will commemorate "Our Lady Day in Harvest," a traditional Irish feast.

The outing is sponsored by Annual Irish Day, Inc., an organization founded 10 years ago by leaders in business, civic, professional and religious life of Chicago of Irish birth and ancestry. James J. Doody, high treasurer of the Catholic Order of Foresters, will be officer of the day. The Rev. Joseph T. Lahart of the Associated Catholic Charities has been named chaplain and the Rev. E. Oliver Boyle of St. Barnabas church moderator. John Joseph Ryan is president of the sponsoring organization.

A highlight of the day will be the selection of a queen. Entries for this event which is open to girls from 16 to 25 of Irish parentage will close Aug. 6 at headquarters of Annual Irish Day, Inc., Room 401, 109 N. Dearborn St. Margaret O'Shea is chairman of

the committee. Exhibitions of Irish dancing will be given by pupils of Irish dancing schools. Irish music will feature waltzes, flutes, and accordions. In the evening a program will be presented by Maurice Lynch's WCFL radio "Irish Hour" talent.

Ill. Bell Telephone Co. Installs 2,000,000th Phone

Another important milestone in the history of the Illinois Bell Telephone Co. was reached yesterday when the company's two millionth telephone was installed in the farm home of Harry Cronister, 12 miles northwest of Springfield.

An afternoon program was held at the Cronister farm to celebrate the occasion, with Illinois state officials, agricultural and farm association leaders, telephone officials, and members of the Cronister family present. Mr. A. H. Mellinger, president of Illinois Bell, presented the telephone to Mr. Cronister after a company installer, Mr. Dave Komyathy, connected and tested the instrument.

Mrs. Cronister made the first call over the telephone to an aunt, Mrs. Herman Schafer in Grand Island, Nebr. Following this, several other demonstration calls

were made, and then the entire group returned to Springfield for a special dinner at the Abraham Lincoln hotel. Later, an evening meeting was held, at which the Bell System film, "The Farmer's Telephone," was shown, and a lecture demonstration, "Magic of Communication," given.

An institute for the mothers of pre-school blind children in Illinois will be conducted at the state school for the blind in Jacksonville from Aug. 25 through Aug. 30.

This Applies To Highland Park, Too

Judge John P. McGoorty, chairman of the Chicago Recreation commission, today issued a warning to all who plan to use Chicago's beaches or other swimming facilities against overtaxing themselves in the water and also against taking undue risks endangering their own lives and the safety of others.

"Most water accidents are avoidable," the Judge said. Wait until the temperature of the water reaches close to 70 degrees before attempting your first season's swim.

- 1. Be sure you are physically fit before attempting to swim.
- 2. Allow at least an hour and probably more time to elapse after eating before entering the water.
- 3. Observe and obey all signs on the beaches.
- 4. Do not dive or jump in until the water has been thoroughly explored and proved free from danger.
- 5. Never swim a long distance (anything over 100 yards) unless life guards are on duty or you are accompanied by a boat manned by two persons.
- 6. Never take foolish chances in or around the water; never call "Help" unless you mean it; Never pretend to be drowning.
- 7. Do not swim after dark.
- 8. Do not use artificial floats. They are unreliable and sometimes through giving the user a false sense of safety permit him to get into serious trouble.
- 9. If an arm or leg cramp develops, call for help and float quietly until assisted or until the cramp leaves. Get out of the water when chilled or tired. Do not overtax yourself.

Food Subsidy Lifts Huge Federal Debt

Federal subsidy of food is one reason for the accumulation of an enormous national debt.

Subsidies totaling nearly \$5,000,000,000 have been paid from the Federal treasury in the last three years on numerous food products. This spending has contributed to the increase in the Federal debt, which now exceeds \$5,000 for every family in the nation.

In the opinion of many economists, the food subsidy program has defeated its purpose. The subsidies, these economists explain, exert inflationary effect on living costs by failing to provide the incentive for increased production by farmers which would be derived from higher prices.
