Food Subsidy Lifts Huge Federal Debt

Federal subsidy of food is one reason for the accumulation of an enormous national debt.

Subsidies totaling nearly \$5,000,-000,000 have been paid from the Federal treasury in the last three years on numerous food products. This spending has contributed to the increase in the Federal debt, which now exceeds \$5,000 for every family in the nation. In the opinion of many econo-

mists, the food subsidy program has defeated its purpose. The subsidies, these economists explain, exert inflationary effect on living costs by failing to provide the incentive for increased production by farmers which would be derived from higher prices.
