**SHELTON-PARSONS WEDDING**

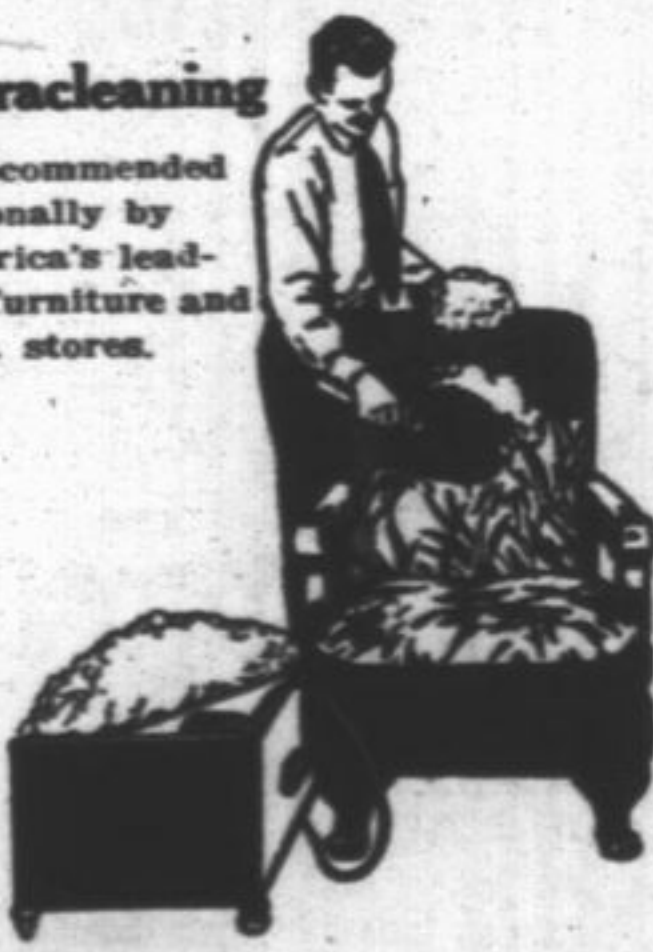
