Mrs. Counselman, 25, was fatally injured on Monday of this week when the car in which she was driving with her husband, E. Gardner Counselman, struck a fire hydrant and telephone pole, near Pittsburgh, Pa., when they were returning from a vacation in the east, during which time they visited the Counselman family residence at Great Neck, I. I. Mr. Counselman, a former naval officer, was also seriously injured.

Mrs. Counselman, a very popular young woman, known hereabouts as "Bobbie," was graduated from Connecticut college and attended the University of Chicago, and had, at one time, posed as professional model for the Powers agency, her picture appearing in several high-class magazines. She was perhaps best known as "The Pepsodent Girl."

An only child, Mrs. Counselman is survived by her husband and parents.
