Need for Staff Assistants Increases Daily

You won't win any medals if you answer this appeal. But—if you come to the rescue of Red Cross staff assistants who urgently need co-workers—you will be a heroine worthy of citation.

For these valiant women—Red Cross staff assistants—365 days a year to do the necessary clerical and stenographic work which makes Red Cross service possible. They work willingly wherever needed, accomplishing prodigious quantities of work. But the "behind the scenes" assignments—which must be done to insure continued Red Cross assistance to the hundreds of servicemen, veterans, and their families who each day call on the Chicago chapter for help—pyramid daily. "MAN"

The Golden Text was:

"Lo, this only have I found, that God hath made man upright" (Ec. 7: 29).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible:

"Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever" (I John 2: 15-17).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy:

"If man were dust in his earliest stage of existence, we might admit the hypothesis that he returns eventually to his primitive condition; but man was never more nor less than man. Man is the idea of Spirit; he reflects the beatific presence, illumining the universe with light. Man is deathless, spiritual. He is above sin or frailty. He does not cross the barriers of time into the vast forever of Life, but he coexists with God and the universe" (pp. 244, 266).
