"God of Creation" Picture to be Shown At U. E. Church

The sound motion picture, "The God of Creation," as prepared by Irvin Moon, Sc.D., will be shown in the First United Evangelical church of Highland Park, on Saturday evening, Oct. 26, at 8.

The showing is sponsored by the Young People's society of the church and will be available for the entire community. Admission free. An offering will be received for expenses.

The church is located at Green Bay and Laurel, and Rev. R. S. Wilson is the pastor.

The picture has been shown previously in the Presbyterian church of Highland Park, as well as in churches in nearby communities. It is acclaimed by all who see it as a great portrayal of the creative power of God. The picture was made in the West coast laboratory of Moody Bible Institute and presents vivid full-color scenes from astronomy and natural science. The actors are from the natural world.

The first part of the picture takes the audience on a trip to the stars by means of solar photographs taken through the 110-inch telescope of Mt. Wilson observatory in California, and views complex gyrations of our own solar system.

Lapse-time photography is utilized to demonstrate the beauties of natural science. The illusion of flower buds developing into full-blown blossoms in a few seconds is created through this time-compressing photo-technique. The metamorphosis of a caterpillar through the various stages from worm to butterfly, and pollination of flowers are seen on the screen in full color. Believed to be the first of their kind are the natural color pictures of photosynthesis, the mysterious food-manufacturing process resulting from the action of sunlight on green leaves.

Through microphotography the audience peers into the microscopic world of a drop of water and observes the complexity of tiny organisms, enlarged more than a million times.

Shall Lake Co. Sanitarium Be Continued?

On Nov. 5 the voters of Lake Co. will be called upon to decide whether or not the institution which has served the collective health of the community for the past seven years shall continue as a county-supported agency in the 10-year period immediately ahead.

For the past seven years the Lake Co. sanitarium has been the nucleus of a tuberculosis control program which has earned recognition throughout the midwest. The voters of Lake Co., aware of the need for concerted anti-tuberculosis program in the community, decided at the polls in the 1936 election to provide for maintenance of a sanitarium for a period of 10 years.

This marked the beginning of the present program. There has been increasing number of new cases discovered in the past several years. Many of these cases are "early" and able to recover because of early diagnosis and immediate treatment. Others can be overcome through simple observation and advice. Others require isolation and prolonged care.

An evidence of the effectiveness of the sanitarium is the drop in the death rate during this period. The majority of new cases discovered are not in need of active hospital treatment. Dr. Chas. K. Petter, superintendent of the sanitarium points out, but are kept under observation through the sanitarium's out patient clinic department. Early discovery and early cure marks just one phase of the extensive program of the Lake county sanitarium.

Last year 179 tuberculosis diagnoses were made, and there were 35 deaths. During the present year, statistics for the first nine months show 155 new cases and 17 deaths.

Since the end of the war, a contract has been entered into with the Veterans Administration to provide care for veterans with service connected disability due to tuberculosis. To date, five such patients have been admitted for treatment.

During the war years, all Lake

county men rejected by selective service because of abnormal chest findings were referred to the sanitarium clinic for re-examination, definite diagnosis and re-classification. This number totaled 138.
