CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

The subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Thursday, November 28, will be:

"THANKSGIVING"

The Golden Text:
"Let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also ye are called in one body; and be ye thankful" (Col. 3:15).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible:
"Sing praises to God, sing praises: sing praises unto our King, sing praises, For God is the King of all the earth: sing ye praises with understanding. . . . Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands. Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name." (Ps. 47: 6, 7; Ps. 100: 1, 4).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy:
"God is Love. Can we ask Him to be more? God is intelligence. Can we inform the infinite Mind of anything He does not already comprehend? Do we expect to plead for more at the open fount, which is pouring forth more than we accept? . . . How empty are our conceptions of Deity! We admit theoretically that God is good, omnipotent, omnipresent, infinite, and then we try to give information to this infinite Mind. . . . Are we really grateful for the good already received? Then we shall avail ourselves of the blessings we have, and thus be fitted to receive more" (pp. 2, 3).
