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Noted Jewish Leaders To Address Mass Cavalcade

Two of the best known rabbis in Reformed Judaism will be the speakers when North Shore Congregation Israel, Glencoe, participates at 8:15 p.m. Friday, Dec. 6, and Monday, Dec. 9, in the nationwide American Jewish Cavalcade.

On Friday evening the congregation, members, non-members and residents of the North Shore will hear Rabbi B. Benedict Glazer of Detroit, Mich.; on the following Monday evening, Dr. Julius Gordon of St. Louis, Mo.

These two famous men are part of a body of 40 outstanding Jewish leaders representing the Union of American Hebrew congregations who are visiting 80 American cities in connection with the Cavalcade. It has as its purpose a reawakening of the religious spirit in an effort to promote peace and brotherhood among nations and men.

Those assembled at the temple on these two nights will also hear from Rabbis Charles E. Shulman and Richard C. Hertz of North Shore congregation.

Special music for both occasions is planned by the choir.

Rabbi Glazer is associated with Temple Beth El of Detroit, fifth largest congregation in the U. S. He was formerly of Temple Rodef Shalom, Pittsburgh and Temple Emanuel, New York City. He is a member of the Commission of Jewish Education, of the Detroit Metropolitan Council on Fair Employment Practice and was one of Detroit's delegates to the American Jewish conference. He has been active in development of better understanding between Christians and Jews and has given many lectures on the subject at colleges and elsewhere. He is not only an authority on Judaism but an eminent platform speaker.

Rabbi Glazer who speaks on Monday evening, Dec. 9, occupies the pulpit of Temple Shaare Emeth in St. Louis, Mo., a position he has held for 17 years. He will emphasize the religious purpose of the Cavalcade. He is a graduate of Hebrew Union college, Cincinnati, O., receiving his D.H.L. degree in 1945. Dr. Gordon has traveled extensively in Europe and Palestine and brings to the North Shore an intimate knowledge of the critical conditions abroad. He, like Dr. Glazer, is author of several outstanding books on Judaism.

Residents of the North Shore, whether Temple members or not, are cordially invited to be present at both meetings, Dec. 6 and 9. Already indications point to a record attendance.
