**Barrett Tells N.S. Council  
About Nuernberg Trials**

The background and origin of  
the acts of hate charged against  
Nazi leaders in Count Four of the  
Neuernberg trials as "crimes  
against humanity," were described  
last night (Tuesday) by Roger  
Barrett, Kenilworth, at a special  
meeting of the North Shore Coun-  
cil of the National Conference of  
Christians and Jews.

Barrett, a Chicago lawyer, re-  
cently returned from Neurenberg,  
where he was a member of Jus-  
tice Jackson's staff, in charge of  
documents. The meeting was  
held at the home of Mrs. Abel Da-  
vis, 600 Sheridan road, Glencoe.  
Members of the executive com-  
mittee and a large number of  
guests attended.

Barrett traced the early devel-  
opment of the trials, and described  
highlights of the defendants and  
the testimony, before discussing  
the nature and origins of the  
charges. Hatreds for minority  
groups, he indicated, were the  
stepping stones to far greater  
crimes, committed in a frenzy of  
self-righteous bigotry and hate for  
anyone who would not serve the  
Nazi ideology or whose persecu-  
tion could further doctrines of the  
"master race."

president of the Deerfield State

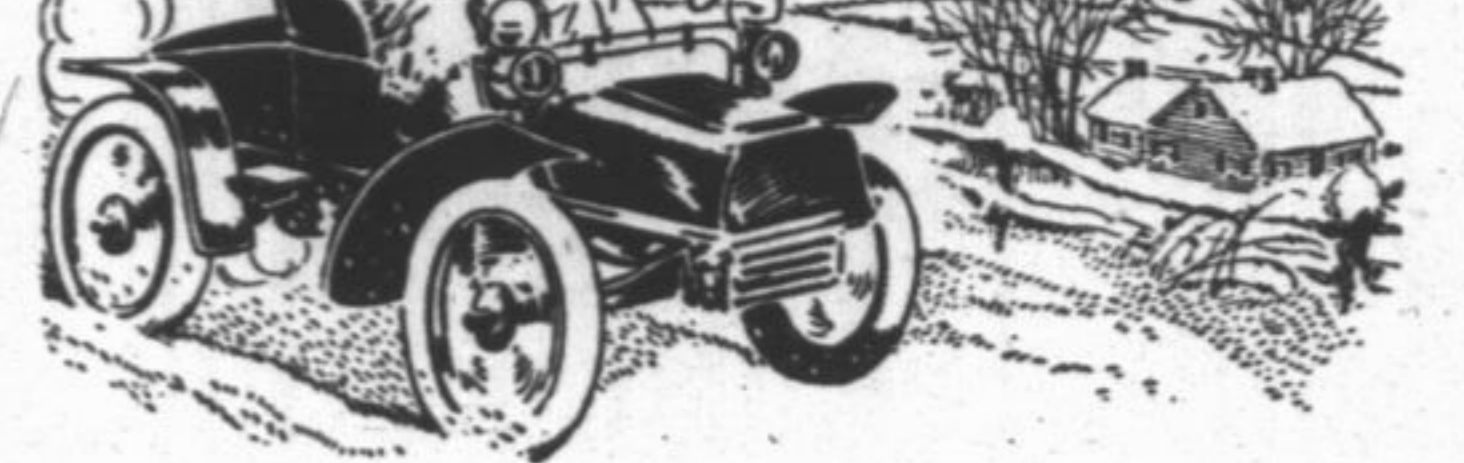
bank. He has also served as vice
