Waukegan Philharmonic To Sponsor Contest Apr. 12 For High School Students

The Waukegan Philharmonic society board of directors is again sponsoring on April 12, 1947, a contest for music students who are high school students in Lake county.

Rules and Information.

1. Instrumental classification shall include piano, xylophone, marimba and harp, woodwind, brass and strings.

2. The contest will be open to students who are pupils in high schools of Lake county.

3. Contestants shall perform standard concert numbers approximately 6 minutes. Contestants shall provide their own accompanists. Not more than six class winners will be selected.

4. Judging will be by competent, out-of-county judges, whose decisions will be final. Items to be considered in judging include tone, interpretation, rhythm, intonation, technique, memorizing, balance with accompanist, suitability of selection, and general effect. Special consideration will be given to the general merit of a contestant's performance for concert presentation.

5. Winners of the auditions will be invited to perform at the society concert of April 27, 1947, at which time they will receive citations and awards.

6. Auditions will be held in Waukegan on Saturday, April 12, 1947. Notice of the exact time and place will be mailed to entrants later.

7. Students who have performed as pros and semi-pros are not eligible to enter this contest.

8. Applicants shall fill out an application form and mail it to O. E. Faldy, chairman of the contest committee, 420 Simpson avenue, Lake Bluff, before March 1, 1947. Application forms may be secured

from local music stores or from Mr. Marshall Meyer, 5 N. Genesee St., Waukegan.
