Elm Place PTA Holds Discussion Meeting

Mr. Vernon Peterson, president of Elm Place school PTA, presided at a meeting for eighth grade parents and teachers on Jan. 7.

The group meeting informally in one of the class rooms was led in its discussion by Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall, director of the Association for Family Living.

Dr. Kirkendall opened the meeting with a clear cut inspection of the norm to be expected of children at the eighth grade level. He pointed out that boys and girls of this age are reaching out for their independence as individuals. They forge ahead into adolescence with one step and withdraw into their better known realms of childhood with their next step.

This is a difficult period for both boys and girls and must be handled with tact and understanding by the parents and the teachers. Group thinking and group standards are very helpful in the handling of these pre-adolescent problems, Dr. Kirkendall pointed out. From his wide experiences as a professor of psychology and family education, Dr. Kirkendall drew many interesting examples of the role the school can play in giving these children the lift they need in expressing themselves and in becoming participating and contributing members of their school and community.
