2. Always use the fire alarm box when available for there is less chance of misdirecting the fire department. Give additional information by telephone if you

want to report a fire."

3. Know where your nearest fire alarm box is located. Operation of the box is simply explained on the outside. Be prepared for fire by knowing how to operate it. When you use the fire alarm make sure you have operated the box mechanism by listening to the whirr.

4. You should always stay by the fire alarm or station someone else there to direct the firemen.

5. Avoid being trapped while telephoning an alarm; it's safer to use a neighbor's phone if available. If you don't hear the hum on the line, telephone wires may
