## Three County Water System Urged for Area

February 2, 1947.

## Chief Hennig Gives Vital Rules for Reporting Fires

Declaring that the public's failure to report fires promptly is the greatest single factor in the nation's fire figures, Fire Chief Hennig today warned Highland Park residents that prompt notification of fire is vital to the fire defense of this community.  
Said Chief Hennig: "According to the National Fire Protection association, fire loss figures are at a 20-year high. One of the chief lessons of the epidemic of fires which has been plaguing the country is that in many instances where there has been a large loss of life and property, the fire department doesn't know of the existence of the fire until it is too late. It is an axiom in firefighting that the first five minutes at a fire are

worth more than the next five hours." If we know about the presence of fire in its initial stages we can isolate and extinguish it before it takes a large toll of life and property.

Chief Hennig laid down the following rules for reporting fires:

1. Call the fire department at once when fire breaks out. The number of your fire department is Highland Park 0. Place this number in a prominent place near your telephone. If mislaid, simply tell your telephone operator: "I want to report a fire."
2. Always use the fire alarm box when available for there is less chance of misdirecting the fire department. Give additional information by telephone if you wish.
3. Know where your nearest fire alarm box is located. Operation of the box is simply explained on the outside. Be prepared for fire by knowing how to operate it. When you use the fire alarm make sure you have operated the box mechanism by listening to the whirr.
4. You should always stay by the fire alarm or station someone else there to direct the firemen.
5. Avoid being trapped while telephoning an alarm; it's safer to use a neighbor's phone if available. If you don't hear the hum on the line, telephone wires may have burned out.
6. Be sure that you make your name and address, including city or town, clearly understood when you use the telephone. See page one of your telephone directory for directions regarding emergency calls.

## LAMB STEW WITH DUMPLINGS



**INTRODUCE** a promise of spring to winter's-end menus by serving fluffy dumplings atop thrifty, heartwarming meat stews. Generous with colorful vegetables, meat stews a la dumplings simplify the problem of making rationed foods do double duty.  
Dumplings are especially efficient carriers of delicious meat flavors for they simmer to feathery lightness in the meat's own juices.  
Hearty stews served this way have a corner on vitamins and other important food essentials. Dumplings made from enriched flour furnish much valuable protein to supplement the protein of the meat. The efficient iron in enriched flour is especially important now that some of our best sources of this nutrient are not as available as they were before the war.

**Lamb Stew with Dumplings**  
2 pounds lamb, cubed  
2 teaspoons salt  
½ teaspoon pepper  
4 cups water

6 medium carrots  
6 small whole onions  
1½ cups green beans  
1½ tablespoons flour  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
Simmer meat in covered saucepan with salt, pepper, and water for 1½ hours. Add carrots, onions, and beans, and continue cooking for a half hour. Mix butter and flour into a paste and stir into the stew. Cook until slightly thickened.

**Dumplings**  
1½ cups sifted enriched flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 egg  
¾ cup milk  
Sift together flour, salt, and baking powder. Beat egg and mix with milk. Add to dry ingredients, stirring only enough to moisten flour. Drop by tablespoons in the hot stew. Cook covered for 5 minutes. Remove lid and continue cooking for 15 minutes.  
Yield: 8 servings.
