Chicago Business Man Speaks in Special Churches

Al J. Conn, Chicago businessman, is the special speaker in the third of a series of special Sunday night services in the United Evangelical church on S. Green Bay road, Sunday evening, Feb. 16, at 7:45.
Press releases concerning Mr. Conn indicate an unusual person. Twelve years ago, he was a hobo and victim of the depression, but at present he is head of the La-Salle Engineering Co., president of the Lakeside Tool Co., and director of the A. F. Anderson iron works. He attributes his change of position to an experience in a rescue mission in Evansville, Ind., when he consecrated himself to God and his service after a life of uselessness. He came to Chicago shortly after that and was remarried to his wife, who had been forced to separate from him several years before due to conditions in the home. In Chicago, he wanted to study for the ministry, but this was not advisable. He became superintendent of the Sunday school in the Epiphany Baptist church, from which place the "Old Sunday School Program" is broadcast every Sunday morning at 9. He also participates in programs of the Christian Businessmen's committee of which he is a member. He is treasurer of the Chicago-Land Youth for Christ, and served as treasurer of the union evangelistic meetings in Chicago Arena last spring.

He travels all over the United States by means of his own plane, to direct the activities of his engineering business which is the second largest of its kind in the world. He is in great demand as a speaker in various parts of the country.

than are entering it each year, and that very few people are entering colleges to prepare for teaching. It therefore appears that the shortage of qualified teachers will continue for several years to come.

In light of this problem, the board has planned a referendum for Saturday, March 1, which will permit the board of education to remove the restrictions on the tax rate which at present limit the board to only a 5 per cent increase in its levy for any one of the next five years. A referendum to accomplish this purpose was held in District 107 in the spring of 1946 and was successful in that district.

The next community meetings to discuss this proposed referendum will be held at Ravinia school on Feb. 25, at 8 p.m., and at Lincoln school Feb. 26 at 8 p.m. These meetings are open to the public.

site is centrally located and can be easily reached from all portions of the city; it would be a safer place for children to play away from traffic hazards; it would provide an ideal community center-park combination, which is considered by community planners as a most desirable plan.

For many years a large, well equipped gymnasium at least 70 x 100 feet in size and having showers and dressing rooms has been the number one recreational need in Highland Park. Such a gymnasium would enable us to conduct athletic activities for children and grown-ups, including basketball, badminton, volleyball, boxing, community dancing and many other community activities.

Teen age quarters have been much in demand by our high school and older boys and girls. A well equipped hangout with a snack bar, comfortable furniture, game and music facilities would be enthusiastically received by them.

Another feature of the proposed community center is a community hall. It would seat several hundred people, have an elevated stage, kitchen, and checking facilities. Here would be conducted community meetings of all sorts, dances and parties. Club rooms for small group meetings will also be available for community clubs and organizations.

Game rooms for the grade school children are part of the present plan and will include play and music equipment. Adequate rooms for art instruction, craft instruction and a community dark room will be included in the plans to care for the many classes which are now being held.

All of these facilities will be located in beautiful, healthful surroundings which should help to keep our children away from the downtown district, drug stores and corners.

ility section will include a new laundry, heating plant and kitchen and more efficient administrative offices and equipment. Necessary costs are estimated at \$140,000.

The fourth phase consists of the proposed construction of a new east wing to provide accommodations for an additional 100 patients. These accommodations will comprise 68 private rooms, 11 semi-private wards, two three-bed and one four bed ward, one sun room and one waiting room and other necessary facilities. Costs for this portion of the plan, including complete equipping and furnishing, are estimated at \$250,000.

As the assets of the hospital are not sufficient to provide funds for the needed program of expansion, the Board of Trustees has authorized and is now engaged in a program to secure the needed additional financing.

As the Highland Park Hospital is largely operated through funds obtained from the citizens of the community it serves, it follows that the only way the hospital can provide itself with the hospital facilities it needs is by voluntary gifts and contributions.

Contributions may be in the form of cash, legacies or pledges. Legacies and pledges may provide for contributions in cash, securities or other real estate.

eligible to compete in the Mid-Western Novice Table Tennis Championships on April 19 at Lane high school. Players must furnish their own paddle and wear dark clothing.

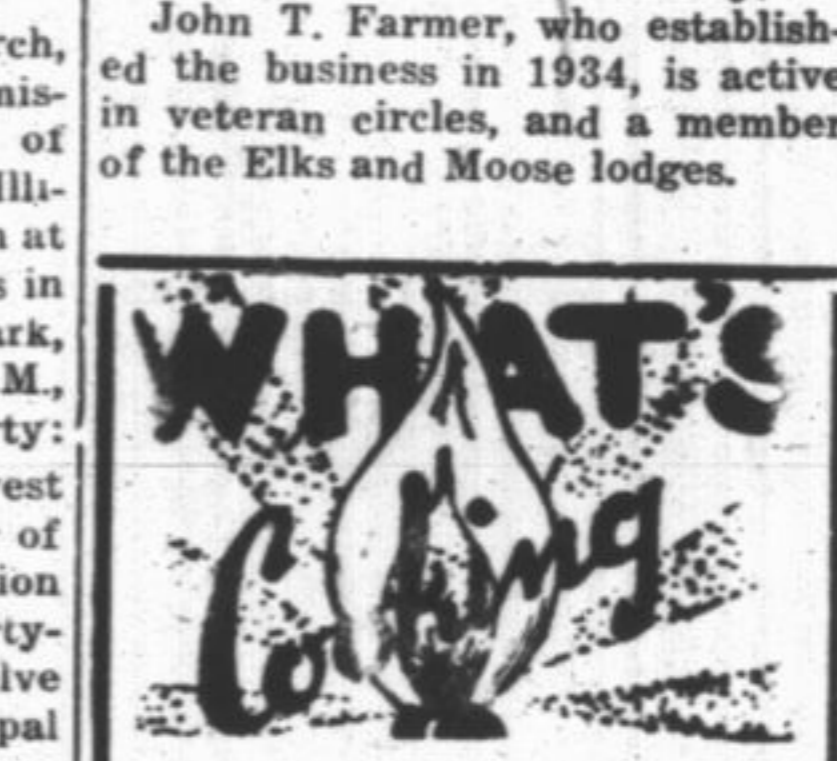
