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THESE RECOMMENDATIONS ARE SOUND

Serious consideration should be given to the three recommendations which closed the recapitulation of the activities of the Highland Park Police Department for the year 1946, printed in last week's issue of The Highland Park Press.

These recommendations were: adding to the strength of the department, enacting a bicycle ordinance and the devising of a system to use the facilities of the city garage for repair of the department's squad cars.

The reasons given for the recommendation of these three steps were, we believe, sound. Certainly we must have sufficient manpower to perform necessary police services in an adequate manner. If the enactment of a bicycle licensing ordinance would help in preventing bicycle thefts, its value to the department's attempts to control juvenile delinquency should, in itself, be sufficient reason for its passage. And as for providing for repairing and maintaining squad cars at the city garage - well, any effort by any city department to economize should receive whole-hearted support.

THE SCHOOL BOARDS DO WHAT THEY CAN

It has been pointed out that in some quarters, last week's editorial Officer Burt managed to grasp his on the general inadequacy of teacher salaries - not only in Highland Park, but throughout the nation, might be taken as an assertion that the various school boards have - at least to some extent, been derelict in their duties. Such, of course, was neither the import nor the intention of the editorial.

It has been pointed out that in District 107, bonuses have been granted and that salary increases have been as frequent and as large on Sunday. as conditions have warranted,

School boards, because of their close contact with the problems surrounding all school operations, are keenly aware of what is needed. The point is, they can be limited by their funds or by public opinion, or by both.

We address our remarks concerning teacher salaries to the public, which not only is public opinion personified, but controls the amount of funds available, either through tax limitations or simply by its opinion. We just want the public to realize what it demands from a teacher and then decide how much it is willing to pay to get what it demands.
