Great Lakes Shows The Way in Providing

Commissioners of Farnsworth, a section of Great Lakes Naval Training center, of whom Emmett Moroney is the Highland Park representative, has shown the way to cope with the problem of housing shortage.

Farnsworth was-formerly Camp Green Bay. It is now a community of young married couples with children who live in comfortable and attractive apartments converted from former navy barracks.
