tial eyes at all of the agencies, located in Highland Park, which receive aid from contributions made to the Chest each year by our citizens. We wanted to make sure that the money was being spent efficiently and to good purpose. We also wanted authoritative information to help us evaluate properly the health and welfare needs of the community, so that our board might determine what grants should be made to fill these needs. The completed report praises the generally efficient administration of various surveyed agencies. It also contributes a number of suggestions for specific improvements and increased cooperation between the agencies that will result in even greater service to our community.

Covered by the survey were the local councils of Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, the Highland Park YWCA, Highland Park Hospital foundation and its women's auxiliary, and Highland Park Social service which is now known as the Family Service of Highland Park. The non-local member agencies were not included in this survey, because the reports of their operations were already available to the Community Chest. These agencies, in which so many of our citizens are interested, are the Ridge Farm preventorium, H. P. Ravinia center of the Infant Welfare society, Lake county Salvation Army, Arden Shore, and the Northwestern University settlement.

Spencer R. Keare, who is chairman of the Chest's social planning committee, has now submitted to each of the surveyed agencies the report dealing with its activities, with recommendations for such changes as would improve its operations and widen its usefulness to the community. His committee is also meeting with each of the non-local agencies, to integrate its needs more completely with the requirements of the Highland Park area.

Great Lakes Shows The Way in Providing Housing Facilities

Commissioners of Farnsworth, a section of Great Lakes Naval Training center, of whom Emmett Moroney is the Highland Park representative, has shown the way to cope with the problem of housing shortage.

Farnsworth was formerly Camp Green Bay. It is now a community of young married couples with children who live in comfortable and attractive apartments converted from former navy barracks. The operation was started a year ago by Gov. Green and Temple MacFayden, chairman of the state housing board, who saw in the empty barracks a measure of relief for the drastic housing shortage. The FHA allotted 27 barracks, and \$450,000 was appropriated by the government for the purpose.

Recently the 14th building was completed, and by midsummer 27 will be ready for occupancy. Each building has 13 apartments, for which the rent ranges from \$38.50 to \$42.50 exclusive of electricity. Recreation facilities are provided and bus transportation for most of the 190 children to near-by schools. Many more veterans have applied for housing.

"Other buildings not used by the navy at Great Lakes could house almost 1000 more families," stated John A. McCormack, executive director of the Farnsworth project.

Fatal Accident in Highwood Sunday

Funeral rites were held in Waukegan this morning (Thursday) for Anthony Dolinar of Waukegan, who was fatally injured early Sunday morning when his car sped across the path of a switch engine just after the gates had lifted after the passing of a train. The gateman said he saw the impending disaster, but was unable to get the gates down in time to block Dolinar's passage.

Miss Eunice Brandt, also of Waukegan, a passenger in the car, was severely injured, and taken unconscious to the Highland Park hospital. At last reports her condition was said to be very low.

Sante Ori Victim Of Brief Illness

Funeral rites were held at St. James church on Tuesday morning for Sante Ori, 647 Chicago avenue, who was taken by death Sunday morning in Highland Park hospital after an illness of one day.

Born in Italy, he had lived in Highland Park since 1905, working as a stone mason until his retirement several years ago.

Surviving are his wife, living in Italy; six children: Nello and Mario of Highland Park; Mary, Elisa, Bruno and Leo, living in Italy; a brother, Joseph, of Chicago, and one grandson.

Interment was made at St. Mary's cemetery.
