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## Women's Club Enjoys Informative and Entertaining Programs

**Morning Program**  
On March 4, the Highland Park Woman's club enjoyed a full day of informative and entertaining programs.

Mr. William Russell Button was the speaker at the morning meeting of the collectors' study group. His subject, "The Golden Age of Color Prints," dealt with the engravings of the 18th and 19th centuries that made this period famous and unsurpassed in the field of color prints.

His talk, designed to bring out its more romantic features, gave the audience a vivid picture of the tedious, laborious processes required to produce the four types of prints now in demand by collectors: stipple, aquatint, lithograph and mezzotint. Slides were

shown to illustrate the difference in methods used, and pictured were some of the original oils and water-colors from which plates were made.

Mr. Button was associated with the House of Ackerman for 35 years.

## Book Review

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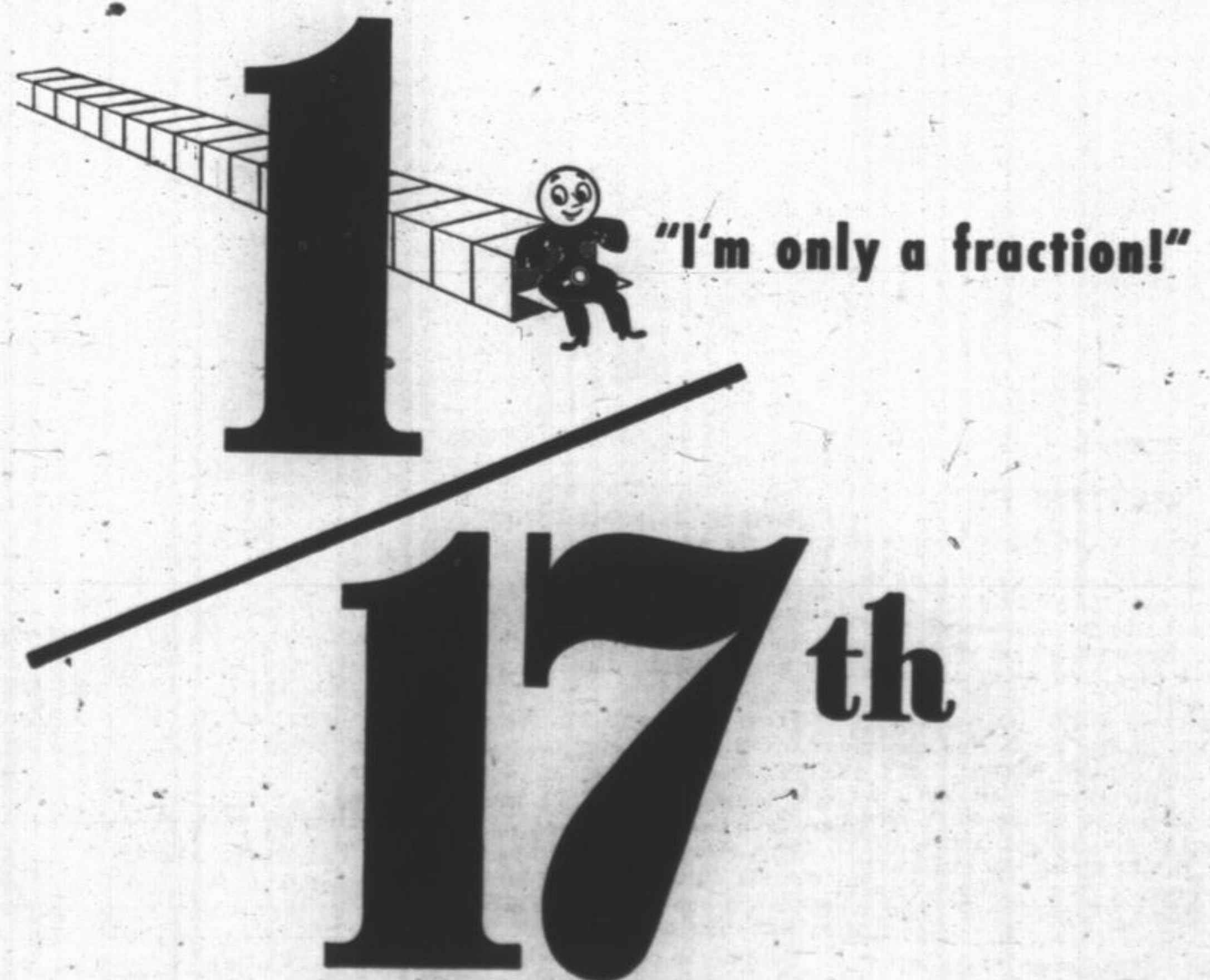
