

Commissioner Turner Announces Improved Street Lighting

Two and one half times brighter illumination for Highland Park's streets at no increased cost to the city has been made possible thru the use of new recently developed types of bulbs, it was disclosed today by Oliver S. Turner, commissioner of streets and public improvements.

Installation of the new, more powerful bulbs, which have been fitted into present street-light outlets has been completed and the entire cost of the change is to be borne by the Public Service Co.

"In order to provide the increased lighting at no increased expense to the city," Commissioner Turner said, "the utility company has obtained approval from the Illinois Commerce Commission for a new reduced rate schedule for overhead street lighting."

Under this new rate, the cost to the city remains the same although the lumens in each light have been upped from 1,000 to 2,500.

This new lighting is an improvement that will be welcomed by all of the citizens of Highland Park.
