North Shore Citizens Committee Okays FEPC

At a regular bi-monthly meeting of the North Shore Citizens committee on Monday, March 21, in the Winnetka Community house, the membership voted unanimously to affiliate with the Illinois Council for a State Fair Employment Practices law and to work for the passage of FEPC legislation now pending in the Illinois State Legislature.

The pending legislation would forbid discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin or ancestry, and would create a permanent fair employment practices commission to prevent such discrimination.

L. Julian Harris, of Highland Park, chairman of the committee on social legislation, pointed out that this type of legislation has been in effect in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Indiana and Wisconsin, and has worked successfully.

A report was given by the committee's delegate to the FEPC hearings in Springfield on March

18. Mr. William E. Peters Jr. of Highland Park told of his testimony before the house and senate judiciary committees representation of civic, veteran, religious, labor, youth, community, welfare, consumer, business and professional organizations which testified in behalf of FEPC legislation.
