## Packard Announces All-New Convertible



This 1948 Super-Eight Convertible "new from the tires up," with quantity production scheduled for June, has just been announced by the Packard Motor Car Company as a supplement to its present Clipper line. Among many stand-out features of the car, described as "America's first all-new postwar convertible" and shown above, are "flush-contour" styling and a new 145-horsepower engine cradled in a specially built frame. There are no rear fenders, the body itself sweeping over the wheels. All windows, front seat and top are power-operated. The instrument panel, with keys that push for both "on" and "off," has dial illumination of "black light," which eliminates night-time glare. The distinctive front end design, company officials point out, preserves and enhances Packard identity.
