Volunteers from the auxiliary and young women's groups of the cities will distribute the flowers on the streets throughout the day. Plans are being made to cover the cities completely so that everyone will have an opportunity to honor the war dead and aid the living victims of the two conflicts.

History of Poppy Day

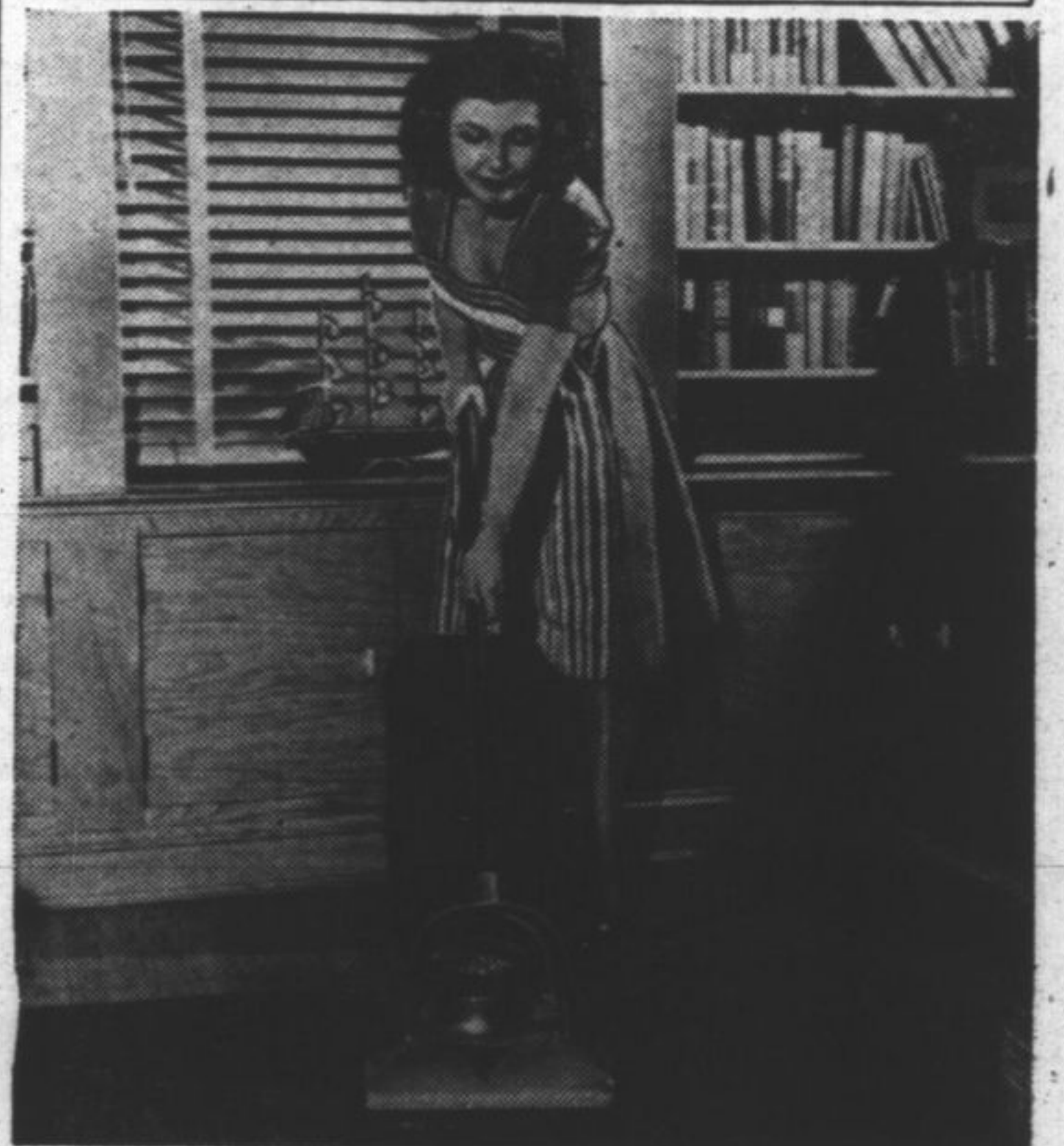
Poppy day has been observed in all parts of the country for many years, according to the auxiliary heads. Poppies have been worn in memory of the war dead since the close of World War I. They are replicas of the wild flowers which grew on the battlefields of France and Belgium, fought over in both wars, but they have come to symbolize memory for those who died in any part of the world.

Flowers Made by Disabled Vets

The poppies which the auxiliary will distribute are all hand-made, shaped from crepe paper by disabled veterans working in hospitals and convalescent workshops throughout the country. The disabled men take special pride in making the flowers to honor their fallen comrades and the work is

valuable to them as occupational therapy, besides bringing them much-needed earnings.

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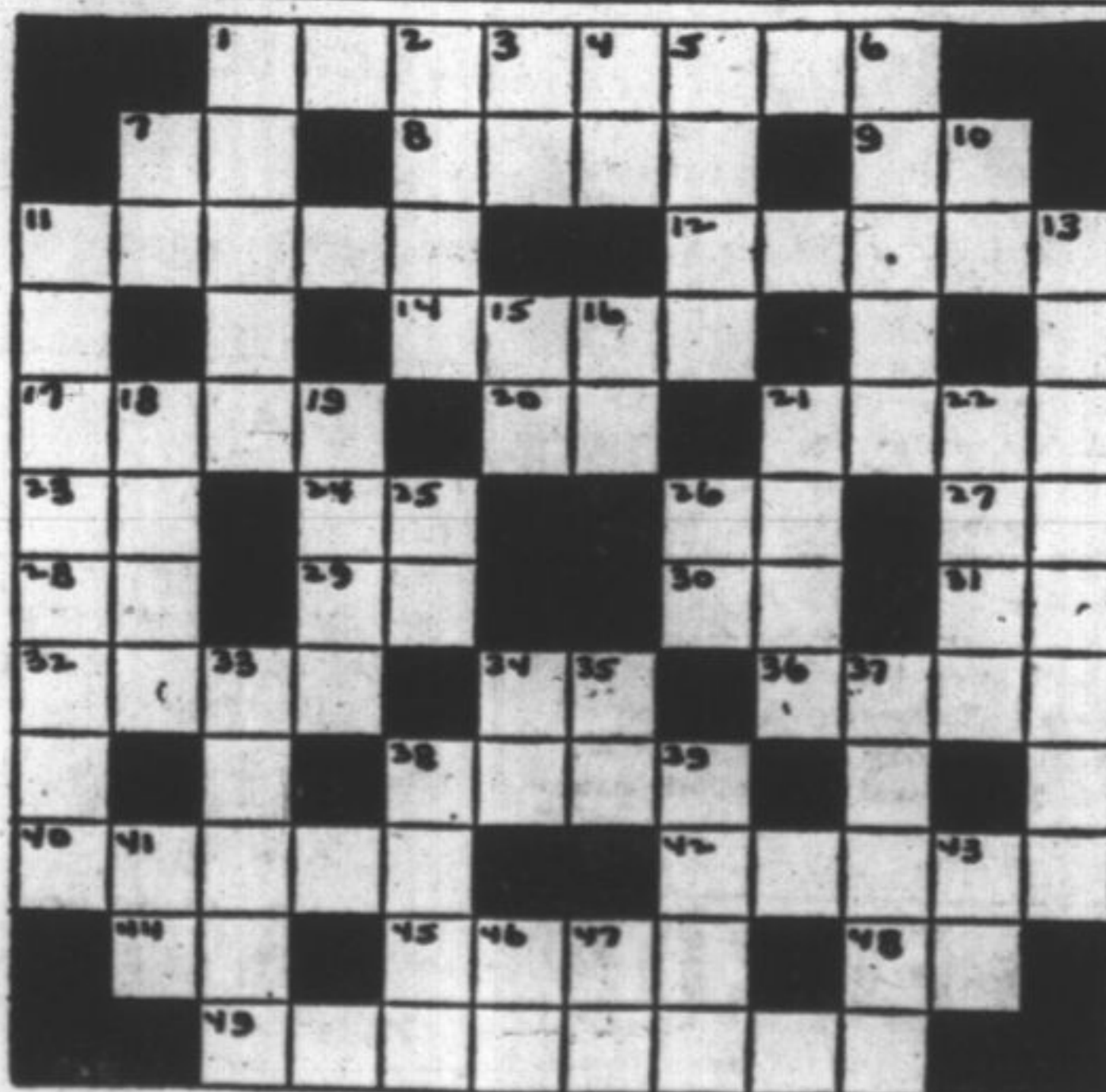
