**National Fire Prevention Week to Be Held May 6-8**

Faced with an average toll of 10,000 deaths from fire, together with property loss which exceeded \$560,000,000 in 1946, President Truman is sponsoring a nationwide effort to cope with the fire menace.

The President's Conference on Fire Prevention is now past the formative stage and a volunteer staff is at work preparing for the meeting, which will be held May 6 to 8 in the departmental auditorium in Washington.

Representatives of municipal and state governments, Federal agencies, and of non-official organizations with a basic interest in fire prevention have been organized into a coordinating committee to draft an agenda for the conference and to appoint committees which will prepare recommendations to be submitted to the conference as a whole.

Conference headquarters is located in Room 7006, Federal Works Building, Washington 25, D. C.

**Health or Disease? It's Up to Us**

For several years the League of Women Voters has been studying public health problems in our county. They recommend a post-war plan for health by the establishment of a county health department.

Who manages the county health department? A board of health composed of seven non-salaried citizens appointed by the supervisors or commissioners. Two must be physicians, one must be a dentist.

Who does the work? A full-time professional staff composed of a public health officer, as many sanitation officers as needed, as many public health nurses as needed, specialists as needed. A clerical staff.

Who makes the health rules? The supervisors or commissioners pass the health ordinances for the county on recommendation of the county board of health.

Who recommends policies? The board of health. The health officer and his professional staff. Medical and dental advisory committees, citizens health committees. Other community health agencies.

Who endorses the plan? American Medical association, Illinois State Medical society, American Public Health association, Illinois Dental society, Illinois Public Health association, Illinois Welfare association, Illinois Congress of Parents and Teachers, Illinois Federation of Women's clubs, League of Women Voters, Illinois Federation of Home bureaus, Illinois Educa. Assn, Illinois State-wide Public Health committee.

Do other counties have health departments? Yes, over half of the counties in the United States have health departments.

Journey Through My Years  
James M. Cox

**Health or Disease: It's Up to Us**

For several years the League of Women Voters has been studying public health problems in our county. They recommend a post-war plan for health, by the establishment of a county health department.

WHAT IS THE COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT? A part of the county government which concerns itself with the protection of all citizens against sickness and death caused by public health hazards.

WHA DOES IT DO? Controls communicable diseases. Prevents communicable diseases by promoting county-wide immunization against them. Works to bring about safe water, milk and food supplies. Promotes proper disposal of human waste, industrial waste, sewage, garbage, etc. Encourages better sanitation in eating places, tourist camps, trailer camps, swimming pools, parks and other public places. Aids in saving the lives of mothers and newborn babies. Helps to prevent accidents. Develops good health habits. Collects and interprets vital statistics. Imparts health information to citizens of all ages.

WHAT DOES IT COST? A county tax levy not to exceed fifty cents per thousand on the assessed valuation of taxable property.

DO WE NEED IT? Yes, as long as our county has sickness and deaths from such diseases as smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, scarlet fever, tuberculosis, syphilis, gonorrhoea, malaria, undulant fever, rabies, tetanus and other communicable diseases. Yes, as long as our county has sickness and deaths from such diseases as typhoid fever, dysentery, intestinal disorders, diseases spread by mosquitoes, rats, flies, ticks and other pests or caused by other unsanitary conditions. Yes, as long as our county has preventable deaths of mothers and new-born babies. Yes, as long as our county has illness and deaths from accidents, poor housing and poor nutrition. Yes, as long as we have absenteeism in industry and schools be-

cause of preventable illnesses. Yes, as long as there are people in our county who do not practice good health habits.
