

National Roll of Honor For Members of U. S. Armed Forces

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 23. The Patriots' Transept, proposed southern arm of the unfinished Washington Cathedral, where the names and war-service records of members of the U. S. armed forces will be enshrined on the permanent National Roll of Honor. The



transsept, upon which more than \$375,000 already has been expended for its foundations and lower works, is one of the next cathedral units to be erected with funds now being raised in a nationwide five-million-dollar campaign.

Highland Park's first war casualty to be enrolled on the permanent National Roll of Honor at the unfinished Washington Cathedral is the late Major Jay Eugene Tremaine, Jr., formerly of 817 Forest avenue, it was announced by the Rev. Merritt F. Williams, canon of the cathedral, and chairman of the National War Memorial committee.

Major Tremaine served with distinction with the army medical corps in the Philippines liberation and was awarded the Bronze star, the Silver star, and the Purple Heart with citations "for Gallantry in action while surgeon of the Zamboanga sector in Zamboanga City, Mindanao. During a night raid by a provisional company of the Philippine constabulary on the enemy positions, Maj. Tremaine voluntarily accompanied and actually led the right platoon of the raiding force. After fighting his way to the heart of the city, Major Tremaine was one of the last to retire from the action and assisted in carrying a wounded man to safety."

Mrs. Clara J. Tremaine of Palos Verdes Estates, Calif., submitted her son's name and war record for enrollment.

Names and service records of both the living and the honored dead of Illinois, submitted for the cathedral tribute by members of their families will be enshrined in the proposed war memorial chapel of the unfinished patriots' transept.

"Names and service records of all service men and women of the recent and past wars are welcomed by the cathedral war memorial committee and the privilege of memorializing the names and records of the war dead and of preserving those of the living, in thanksgiving for their safe return, is open to all," Canon Williams said.

"The enrollment of names and records," he added, "is not contingent upon any consideration other than the expressed wish of families or next of kin."

The patriots' transept and five additional bays of the cathedral nave are immediate objectives in the current building fund campaign for five million dollars. Cash and pledges of \$396,000 have already been obtained in Washington prior to intensive solicitation elsewhere.

The War Memorial chapel, according to plan, will be ornamented by insignia of famous units of the army, navy, marine corps and coast guard. When ready for use, the national roll of honor will be maintained here and preserve forever the names and records of all revered war dead and in commem-

oration of the war services of the living who returned safely.

Heroes of past wars and other distinguished military figures now buried here or commemorated in the cathedral include former President Woodrow Wilson, Adm. Dewey, Lt. Gen. Nelson A. Miles, and many others.

Names and records of the living and deceased veterans of this area are being sought by the committee and enrollment forms can be obtained from Washington Cathedral, Mount St. Alban, Washington, D.C.

Modernization and Repair Work at Fort Sheridan

Five hundred and eighty thousand dollars has been allocated to Fort Sheridan by the war department to be spent this summer for repair and modernization of permanent buildings on the post, according to word received here this week. Work on the project will begin immediately.

Buildings which will receive badly needed attention and maintenance include office buildings, warehouses, enlisted men's barracks, officers' quarters, non-coms' quarters, theater No. 1, the NCO club and the officers' club, all of a permanent category.

Labor for the project will be done on a contract basis, with awards going to local bidders. Such work as painting, modernization of heating, plumbing and lighting facilities, interior and exterior decorating and structural work, including necessary replastering and re-flooring will be done.

Painting and structural work was begun on several buildings on Monday, and the entire project is expected to be completed by the end of September, according to Major Francis E. McCormack, post engineer, who will have supervision of the program.
