Thrift Shop Sales During Past Year Total \$11,616.49

When Infant Welfare members' enthusiasm for the Thrift Shop and the loyalty of the Highland Park branch of Northwestern Settlement are added to the staunch support of the Hospital auxiliary, the total sum in annual profits for the Thrift Shop is a substantial figure. Exclamations of surprise were heard at Monday morning's Thrift Shop board meeting when Mrs. Jay Glidden, treasurer, read the figures and contributions made during the past year. Shop sales totaled \$11,616.49.

At the end of each month, the Thrift Shop board divides shop profits four ways: one-fourth to each supporting organization and the remaining fourth is distributed among worthy organizations and charities. This year the Alendale farm, American Red Cross, Arden Shore association, Girl Scouts, Highland Park Community center, Highland Park hospital building fund, Highland Park Social service, high school scholarship fund, Illinois Industries for the Blind, Lake Co. Tuberculosis sanatorium auxiliary, Morgan playground committee, Park Ridge school, Ridge Farm preventorium, Seeing Eye, UNRRA food emergency and Veterans hospital at Downey were remembered.

Serving on the Thrift Shop board with five executive officers are the presidents and two members of the supporting organizations. Mrs. Francis Knight, who is beginning her second year as president, will be assisted in the coming year by Mrs. Edwin M. Hadley Jr. as vice president; Mrs. Horace Vaile, secretary; Mrs. Jay Glidden, treasurer, and Mrs. Earl Wallis, publicity. Mrs. Howard

Detmer, Mrs. Benjamin F. Lewis and Mrs. William Jones are retiring board members.

In July, 1946, the office of honorary second vice president was created and given to Mrs. Roswell Swazey in honor of her untiring devotion and help to the Thrift Shop board over a period of years.

Shop stock and sales have been stimulated throughout the year by parties and special events such as a "Back to School" sale in August, the Infant Welfare "Tea for Toys" in October, the Thrift Shop "White Elephant Tea" in February and the June rummage party given by Northwestern Settlement.

In reporting to the board on Monday, Mrs. Knight acknowledged the splendid help of Mrs. Simpson, paid manager of the Thrift Shop by saying, "Her devotion to duty; her knowledge of her customers and her cheerfulness and cooperation with the board cannot be measured in words. With her help and the help of each of our board members, I am sure this coming year can equal — if not surpass — the year just completed."
