The summer session offers not only a chance to raise a grade for college entrance requirements, but even more important, it gives the student whose regular courses are prescribed by college entrance requirements or other factors, an opportunity to take subjects which otherwise would necessarily be outside the scope of his high school to Ravinia and Chicago music lovstudies.

Purchase of property on Second Co. as the site for a future dial telephone building was announced this week by E. M. Knox, manager,

The property has a frontage of 225 feet on the west side of Second street and a depth of 150 feet. It is improved with two \$457,000 Collected frame houses.

Knox said the Illinois Bell's plans call for the erection of a two-story and basement fire-resistive building of modern design. Start of construction, he added, will depend on approval by the Civilian Production administration and the availability of mate-
