6. The school patrol.

The purpose of an effective school patrol is to insure the health and safety of the children. Pupils of the school are selected to be patrol members, and are given intensive training in safety. Mr. McKee trains his patrol groups in the spring so when school resumes in the fall a well trained patrol is ready to assume its duties.

He has developed a merit system at Lincoln school through which a check is made of the conduct and attitude of each member while on duty.

Also he holds general patrol meetings in which the group has an opportunity to plan changes in patrolling and to evaluate its services.

A part in the school play, membership on the school team and even the necessity for making up school work plays a subservient role to the time the boy spends on patrol duty.

To emphasize the importance of the patrol members and to inform the entire school and the community of the work of the patrol, Mr. McKee, at intervals presents the school patrol to the student body in an assembly. The presentation of patrol oath cards, captains and lieutenants' badges, and Sam Browne belts is a definite part of the school ritual.

The Lincoln school patrol has become an effective means for developing sound habits of responsibility, health and safety among the patrol members and pupils alike.

The patrol is received by all as an integral part of the school's total safety program — a program co-operatively conceived and designed to help children develop habits of safety that will enable them to live safely in our modern world.

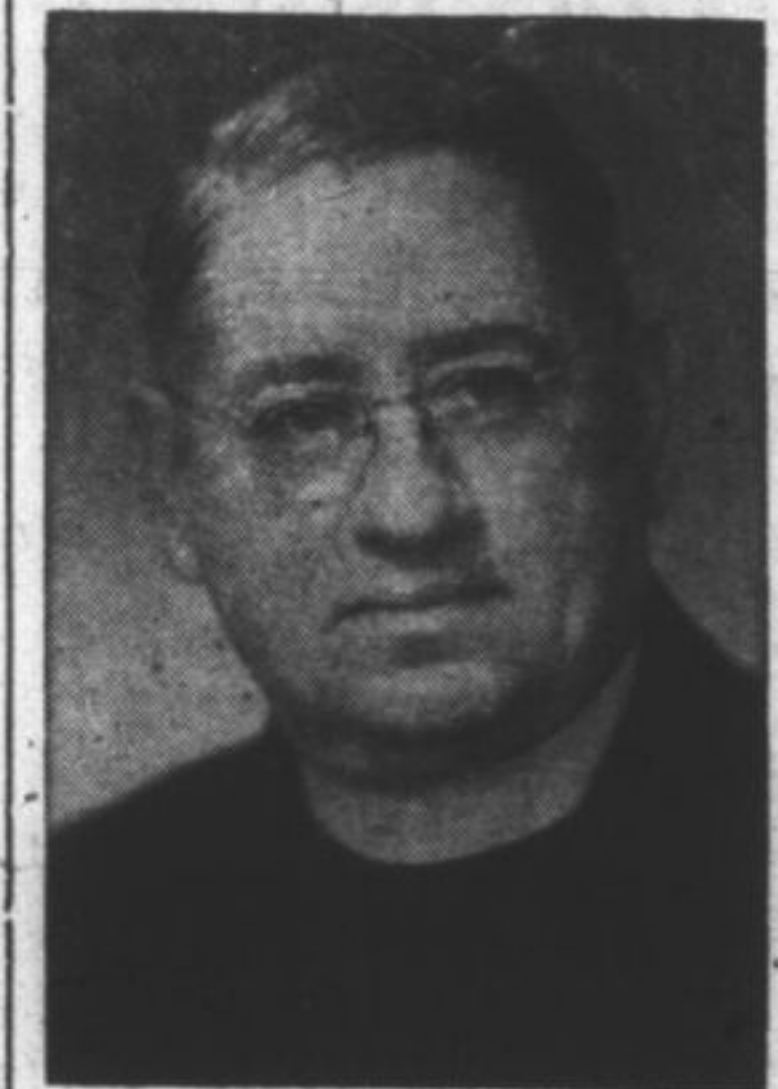
Squadron 51 of Deerfield, under the leadership of Chairman Bob Newell, put on an exhibition of U-control gas model planes in action.
