SURPRISE PARTY

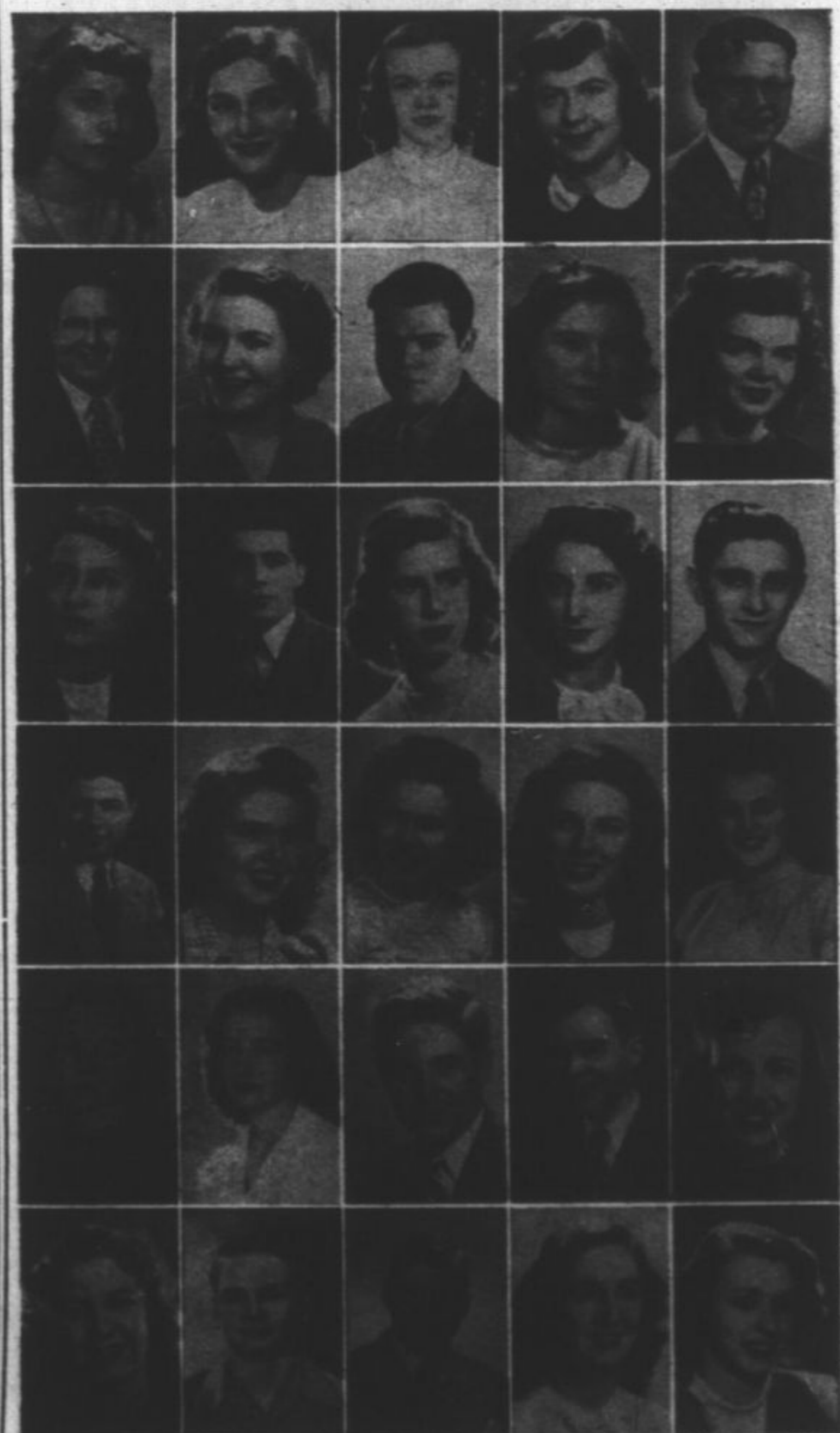
About thirty-five relatives surprised Ted Zabel at a party at his home on Saturday evening.
