Rep. Kelsey Opposes Blomstrand Bill

Representative Harold B. Kelsey, Eighth Dist. Republican, this week announced his opposition to the Blomstrand Bill and other similar measures now pending in the Assembly to create an Illinois "Little Dies Committee."

"I am sure they will not be given any consideration and will not be enacted," Kelsey declared. "It is high time we get back to the old fundamental principles of our democracy."

Representative Kelsey's statement came in a letter to the No. Shore chapter, American Veterans committee, which had written him urging defeat of the bill. Other civic organizations have joined in attacking legislation of this type.

Objections to the Blomstrand Bill are based on the sweeping powers which it would give to an Illinois Un-American Activities committee. The bill's opponents point out that citizens haled before such an Illinois "Gestapo" would lose their constitutional protections of trial by jury and appeal.

"We here in the General Assembly," Representative Kelsey told the AVC chapter, "should do our utmost to protect those rights."

To Shrine of St. Anne De Beaupre

Two periods of special devotions at the most famous basilica in No. America will be observed by the members of the Inaugural Chicago Archdiocesan pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, in Canada, it has just been announced. The mission which is scheduled to take place from Aug. 9 to 17, has been approved by His Eminence Samuel Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago. The official pilgrimage itinerary includes a three-day cruise of the beautiful Saguenay and St. Lawrence rivers.

The days on which the members of the Canadian pilgrimage will visit the shrine of St. Anne are Thursday and Friday, Aug. 14 and 15. The official itinerary calls for the members to leave Chicago in special railroad cars on Saturday, August 9. They will arrive in Niagara Falls that evening, for an overnight stay.

The pilgrims will sail from Quebec on Friday evening, arriving at Montreal the following morning. The return train journey to Chicago will be made on Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 16 and 17.

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Fort Sheridan Reduces Civilian Employee Force

A reduction in the force of 322 civilian employees at Fort Sheridan will take effect by June 30, it has been announced by Col. Newton G. Bush, commanding officer. The reduction began on May 29 and will continue through the month, affecting more than 60 per cent of the civil service employees at the post.

Reduction of civilian personnel has been gradual over the past year as necessity dictated.
