LUTHERANS PLAN EXPANSION OF WORK

Lutheran Convention in Chicago

The Lutheran Synod of Missouri in Convention assembled are planning to expand work for the second Century of their history in this country. Delegates representing over 5,000 congregations and preaching stations with a total of 1,564,000 adherents, are in Centennial assembly from July 20th to July 29th at the Palmer House, Chicago, for the Fortieth National Convention of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and other states.

An historic pastoral service will be held on Friday, July 25th, in First St. Paul's Lutheran Church, in which edifice, then located at the corner of La Salle and Ohio Streets, the constitution of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of

ans who over 100 years ago, in order to escape religious persecution and to worship God according to the dictates of their own conscience, came to America and founded the Lutheran Church, commonly known as the Missouri Synod, which has enjoyed such a remarkable growth making one of the great, interesting stories of expanding Christianity during the past century.

Lutherans of the Missouri Synod are recognized as leaders among the Protestants in the educational field, having established a nationwide system of 1,210 private Christian day schools, with an enrollment of over 80,000 children.

Chicago Lutheranism, as far as the Missouri Synod is concerned, had its beginning one Sunday afternoon, late in 1843, during a heavy blizzard when nine men and



Missouri, Ohio and other states, was effected on April 26th, 1847.

On Sunday, July 27th, 1947, a gigantic Centennial rally and service will be held at Soldier's Field, 3:00 P. M., at which Dr. J. W. Behnken, president of the Missouri Synod, will preach the sermon to a congregation which is estimated will be in excess of 75,000. Special trains, buses and chartered planes will bring Lutherans from distant points for this centennial celebration.

Before the end of the year 1843, the little congregation received as a gift from William Butler Ogden, "The city's richest man," and Walter L. Newberry a piece of property on the southwest corner of Ohio street and La Salle, in an area which at the time was largely swampland dotted here and there with small groves of trees. The unpretentious church building was finished in February 1844 from lumber carried by the men of the congregation on their shoulders from the Jackson Street Bridge.



Cong. Church Favors Larger Tax Free Gifts For Scientific Research

In a speech on the floor of the House, Congressman Ralph E. Church, (R), 10th District of Ill., argued that the Congress should liberalize the tax laws to permit larger tax-free gifts by corporations and individuals for scientific research instead of establishing the National Science Foundation to make expenditures of public funds for that purpose.

Church contended that the proposed program for a National Science Foundation "has far-reaching implications." He said that "it must be recognized that however able and however honest those appointed to the Foundation, the Foundation will be a political agency and will be subject to all kinds of political pressures."

Church said that he was studying the tax laws with a view to suggesting how legislation with respect to encouraging "gifts and donations to hospitals, colleges and other organizations engaged in research work, can be made.

He suggested that the National Science Foundation proposal be set aside until the Ways and Means Committee had opportunity to consider such revision in our tax laws.

Seek Civilian Employees For Overseas Posts

Men needed for civilian positions overseas in connection with the program for return and final burial of World War II dead are being recruited in this area it was announced today by Colonel John N. Gage, Commanding Officer of the Chicago Quartermaster Depot.

A wide range of employment is being offered to qualified personnel who wish to take part in this program as members of one of the fourteen Field Operating Sections of the American Graves Registration Service which will tour the entire Pacific, Far Eastern and India/Burma areas. The Field Operating Sections will be organized and outfitted at Honolulu, Hawaii.

Among the positions now open and yearly salaries paid are: Administrative assistant, \$5187; licensed embalmers, \$4246.50 and \$3306; property and supply clerk, \$2992.50 and \$2710.35; medical technicians (chemistry), \$2992.50 and \$2710.35; medical technicians (roentgenology), \$2992.50 and \$2710.35; photographer, \$2710.35 guards, \$2525; storekeepers, \$2992.50 and \$2710.35; motor vehicle dispatcher, \$2525; nurses aid, \$2992.50; guard (convoyer), \$2804.40; reports and records clerks, \$2992.50; clerk typists, \$2710.35.

In addition, mess managers, cooks, second cooks and assistant cooks are needed. Pay for these positions ranges from \$1.45 to \$95 an hour.

Those who qualify for these positions will be entitled to certain privileges accorded civil service employees, including vacation and sick leave. In addition, hospitalization and treatment of civilian personnel will be provided at a minimum cost in areas where Army dispensaries are available. Men enroute to take government employment in Hawaii will receive \$6 a day, while in a travel status within the continental limits of the United States when quarters and subsistence are not furnished at government expense, plus base salary.
