Promising Young Artist Exhibits Work In Mandel Galleries

Stanley Mitruk of the Arden Shore Camp at Lake Bluff is holding an exhibition of his work in the galleries at Mandel Brothers in Chicago. Mr. Mitruk is a very promising young artist. He is a native Chicagoan and one of the outstanding graduates of the Chicago Art Institute.

In his figure painting and drawing, Mr. Mitruk's work shows strong suggestions of intensive study of such masters as Picasso; his two oils are reminiscent of the still life work by Cezanne; his lithographs also are powerful. His woodcut "Paris" in the collection, received the Art Institute Print Committee Award in the Thirty-first Annual Exhibition of the work of Chicago Artists at the Art Institute. His "Self Portrait," a small oil study, is one of the outstanding canvases in the collection. It has been loaned for the exhibit by Katherine Kuh, a prominent member of the Art Institute Faculty.

The exhibition at Mandel Brothers includes unique finger painting by Helen Circle and water colors by Pearl Dawn Nutt. It will be on view through September 6 in Mandel Bros. 9th floor galleries.

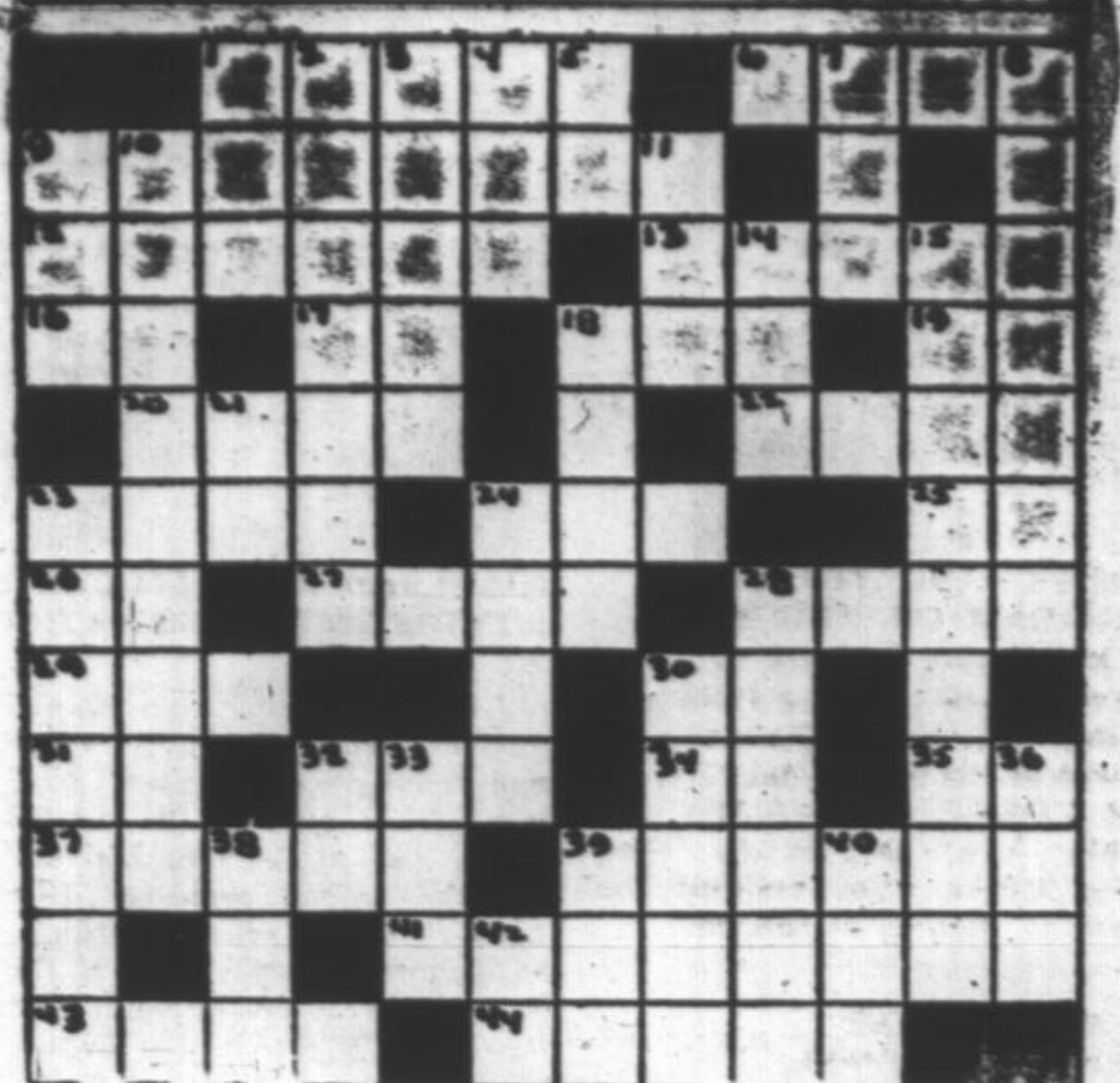
