## Highwood Boasts Only Tavern in Nation That's Half Wet—Half Dry

It has been claimed that the new Haven which was recently opened by James Fiochi at the corner of Highwood and Waukegan Ave. in the center of the City of Highwood is the only tavern in the nation

which is half wet and half dry.

This unique distinction is as the result of the fact that the front part of the new Haven is in the city of Highwood and the rear half in the city of Highland Park. A wall divides the two sections and for those who wish one has merely to step through a door to go from one city to the other.

The front part has been completely refitted with new fixtures as a modern cocktail lounge and liquor store. The rear part which is in the city of Highland Park, according to Mr. Fiochi will be converted into an attractive club room or sandwich bar where soft drinks only will be sold.

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
