The stage manager is Gordon Garrett, and he is assisted by Stanley Grace. Lighting is under the supervision of David Brown and John Sickle.

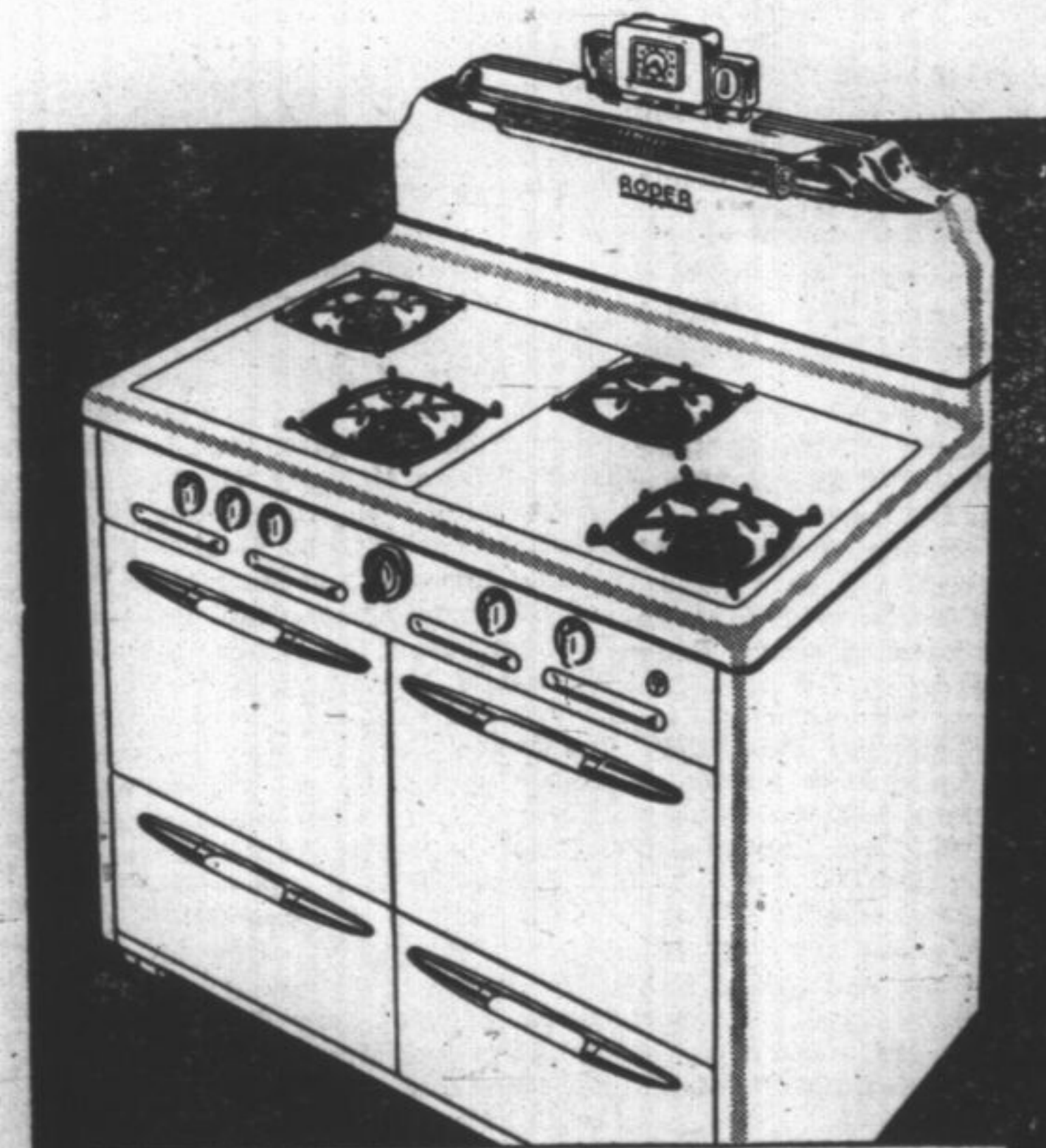
Scenic design is being planned by Mr. MacLaughlin and Miss Marquart. Costumes and dance coaching will be by Ken Harder.
