For instance, what is to prevent the Northwestern Railway from taking over the electric railroad between Wilmette and Waukegan, to operate it as a shuttle line for local service, connecting at each end with fast hourly through trains from Chicago to Milwaukee? This would enable the CNW to abandon unprofitable non-rush hour local steam trains, to increase pay loads, and to consolidate stations and ticket offices for a more efficient operation.

For our communities, it would mean all-day service to Chicago twenty minutes faster than the present electric line, instead of twenty minutes slower as it would be in the case of the proposed bus. To save 20 minutes, no one north of Wilmette should mind a transfer there on non-rush hour trains; no doubt, some sort of a new four-track station would eventually arise at that point. Wilmette citizens would be compensated for the loss of the North Shore electric service by the new importance of that stop for fast through-diesel trains.

Now's the time to plan for better transportation—or to resign ourselves to worse.

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
