Light Values from 50 to 85 Foot Candles

The resultant lighting proved both adequate, evenly diffused, and pleasing. A series of spot checks with a light meter indicated light values of from 50 to 85 foot candles at desk top levels. Inasmuch as 20 to 50 foot candles is considered by lighting engineers as adequate for moderately critical and prolonged tasks such as reading, bench work, and classwork, the installation was considered a
